Welcome & Call to Order: Co-chair Davis called the meeting to order at 6:32.

- County has money to do an economic analysis of what it would look like if Kingston incorporated. Money likely is not going to be available next year.
 Not saying that we need to have a formal discussion about incorporation but if there's interest in conversation, would like to get an RFP out for an outside

party to perform the work.

Approval of Prior Meeting Minutes: Davis moved to approve. Hutchinson seconded. No discussion. Approved unanimously.

Guest Speaker:

- David Forte and Melissa Moore: Kitsap Public Works. Transportation Improvement Program

- Kingston-specific TIPS:
 - ATMS predicted to be operational in the fall
 - 104 Realignment-delayed for fish passage barrier investigation
 - West Kingston-Middle School bridge-applied for Safe Routes to School grant and were denied. Can reapply in a couple of years.
- North Kitsap TIPS
 - Little Boston Culvert-needs more Navy money
 - Port Gamble Trails-small segment to be constructed as part of the parking lot (this summer)
 - Stottlemeyer-North Maintenance facility (ready by end of year)
 - Suquamish (Augusta)--putting in sidewalks and bike lanes. Grant for preliminary engineering, need \$\$ for construction. Seeking grant this fall.
 - Fish passage on Sam Snyder Creek in Poulsbo
- Funding sources are flat or declining, and grant money must typically be matched by county to some extent

- Council Questions

- Glen: Mentioned criteria for scoring. Our NK population is smaller for the rest of the county. Explain your criteria for how NK gets considered in your criteria?
 - A: we try to keep the projects balanced in the county over time. Not just population-based. Are we spreading funding throughout the county
 - A: we work with the commissioners and did a significant overhaul of our scoring system. Not going to be balanced perfectly over a 6 year period. Funds from impact fees must stick in their impact fee district.
 - A: rural town centers grant opportunities—only Kingston, Poulsbo, Keyport, and Manchester are eligible
- Kate: Twin Spits repaved-will the rest of Hansville be repaved? How long ago did the repaving process start?
 - A: project delivery. If we have the money, the project will take 4-6 years to implement.
 - Clarification: couldn't give you the details of repaving. We have a person who does repaving throughout the county. Maintenance is separate from TIPS
- Kate: Arborwood has some money for transportation improvements 104/Hansville Road. Do you have the money to make these improvements?
 - A: No. And this is a state highway. Now, working on a roundabout at 104 and Hansville. Tribe, county, and state are interested. But doesn't hit the deficiencies/maintenance categories for the state to trigger redoing their signals.
 - Q: Left hand turn on 104 to Miller Bay with money from Arborwood–still happening?
 - A: don't know
- Beth: Safe Routes to School: car projects can use online info about how many cars move through an area. When talking about kids who walk along a road, how do you engage in this sort of scoring?
 - A: Run by WSDOT. Program doesn't actually ask how many kids walk to school, since the improvement will likely increase. Current student walking count isn't as relevant. Questions: how many cars, speed, ada barriers, present sidewalks, etc.
- Beth: does the fact that we have three schools clustered together make an impact on the analysis?
 - A: Possibly. Category is density of potential use. Example: Central Valley. But Mr. Forte's impression is that more cities than counties receive funding through this program.
- Tim: Public suggestions and you know you're going to get unrealistic

public suggestions. On the flip side, can you admit that Kingston residents are very attuned to their roads and transportation. Suggestions that have resulted in finished projects?

- A: most suggestions were previously identified by us. We don't track where the suggestion came from.
- Tim: dream project of rotary at 104 and Barber Cutoff. If WSDOT said they were OK with it, would the county have to pay for some of it?
 - A: depends. If there's a logical extension to county roads outside
 of their own existing right of way, we could match our own
 project at the same time. Realignment was a community push.
 ATMS was a community push, county got the grant and helped
 lobby and partnered with WSDOT.
- Public Questions
 - Status of Miller Bay shoulders. Submitted numerous times. Was a tier 1 for several years, and now it's disappeared. How to get it added back?
 - A: extremely expensive project.
 - Followup: stormwater runoff concerns. Innovative proposals were ignored. Frustrated because you ask us to make more suggestions yet we get ignored.
 - A: ability to deliver the project on this one isn't possible.
 - Commissioner: RAISE grants not included. (Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE))
 - A: three projects in this area. South Sound to Olympic Trail– Poulsbo to Olympic Park, Sound to Olympic Trail from Agate Pass bridge to Poulsbo, non-motorized improvements going up to Suguamish
 - PG S'klallam Tribe-feasibility of non-motorized ways for people to get from Kingston to Hansville
 - Question: sidewalk between West Kingston road and Gordon (along Barber Cutoff). Factors to make it a higher priority? Tim added: we didn't get the grant money for the bike path between high schools and middle schools. With the addition of ATMS, we all agree that traffic is going to increase along this road. What can Kingston residents do to make it safer for kids to get to school?
 - A: Barber Cutoff is swamps on both sides. Can you construct it?
 - A: What is the school's walking route right now? Goes through the subdivision. Most of the houses are up in the north. School could build a better pathway.
 - Followup: Kids walk holding hands from the Village Green along that shoulder
 - Question: you're referring to the path that used to exist through Kingston Hills, which was closed because Rob Gelder was here. Residents and HOA said it was closed.
 - A: for half of it.
 - Question: you led the Complete Streets Project effort. Is there anything on the TIP that are complete streets-related projects?
 - A: Complete Streets was completed just as I was starting. Yes,

there are some past projects that have been Complete Streets supported.

- Question: the existing/old public works facility in Poulsbo-what will happen to it?
 - A: likely needs to be cleaned up, then sold.
 - Follow up: could money be used for some of our issues?
 - A: no, being used to fund new facility
- Question: closure on Bond Road for fish passage remediation—what's the re-route going to be?
 - A: don't know, but it's cheaper and faster to close the road.

- **Transportation:** (Tim Davis)
 - ATMS call today to talk about the status with stakeholders from county, state, etc. Contract signed. Complex process because Public Works is doing the work for WSDOT, which makes it harder to get things done. Construction to start early July, possible launch in the fall. Issues for grace period for the timestamp on the tickets.

• Community Services (Cynthia Logan)

- Met in May, recapped joint discussion with other KCAC subcommittees. Discussed the announcement of the change in principals at Kingston High. Made an agreement to invite new principal to come and speak at next committee meeting. Had previously coordinated with the schools to make connections with existing principals so they'd like to continue this work with new administrators. Communicated with middle school principal last week regarding a student who is at risk.
- Chris brough info about the Public Hospital District (upcoming meeting topic)
- Kingston CARES will not be able to be involved in Social Service Wednesdays project. Once per month, Poulsbo Library, agency

- representatives in the facility there to talk to walk-ins. Want to make it a once-per-month activity in Kingston
- Accessibility Committee: Nancy was at the meeting on Tuesday.
 Wish to develop accessibility for wheel chairs and sightchallenged folks in North Kitsap
- Affordable Housing Subcommittee (Chris)
 - Affordable Housing group celebrated the opening of the Times Square project on May 28.
 - They'll be presenting at the August KCAC meeting

• Environment & Land Use (Beth)

- Trying to decide whether to meet before or after the public meeting re: Year of the Rural. Haven't met much lately
- Q: Year of the Rural "Hybrid" language-what does that mean?
 - A: beginning will be online to watch the presentation and then breakout into small groups and turn off Zoom
