Welcome & Call to Order: Council Chair Tim Davis called the meeting to order at 6:31 pm.

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- Rebecca Pirtle: Kingston Projects List is updated on the county website. Anyone can join any of our groups, don't have to be KCAC member.
 - O Commissioner: this is the list of projects in permit phases at the county level so folks can understand anything in Kingston of community interest.

Guest Speakers: Andy Nelson, Tim Beachy (Public Works) + John Vezina (Wash. State Ferries) to speak about Automated Traffic Management System

- Andy Nelson—county Public Works Director
 - Public Works is Transportation BUT ALSO Sewer Utility Services, Recycling and Garbage, and Stormwater—the Ohio stormwater project just got finished.
 - Also here: Tim Beachy, Project Manager for ATMS and many other Kingston projects
 - Ferry Initiative for Kingston Solving Issues with Traffic—46 year old poster also about ferry congestion
 - 104 Working Group–10 years of work in Kingston with people from various agencies and local members
 - Slides Presentation
 - Kingston—One of the 3 major crossings of Puget Sound. Considered a High Capacity Transit Hub
 - Initial objective was to create a holding lot to the west of Lindvog
 - Phase 1: Automated Traffic Management System to remove the need for human LE intervention.
 - Phase 2: 104 realignment. Funded by Move Ahead WA legislation. 18ish million dollars.
 - QUESTION: have you worked with local businesses?
 - A: Yes, Working Group includes Chamber
 - QUESTION: is Coffee Oasis going to have to go away?
 - A: No.
 - QUESTION: Does current plan address fast ferry issues for parking?
 - A: No. Does not include parking.
 - QUESTION: Impact on 1st street: homes north of first (Ohio, Iowa, Lindvog)--Several hundred homes with people who are going to be impacted by the ferry offloading?
 - A: in all of the convos we have had with the WG, we understand that we are not removing ferry traffic. Still have an important function of state highway through Kingston. Conversation about 1st street will be part of next phase of discussion.
 - QUESTION: Are you going to prioritize pedestrian safety with your plans? Walking along 1st now is very dangerous. No visible crosswalk.



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- QUESTION: Sound barriers?
 - A: we have to think about this.
- **Tim Beachy**: three objectives for this presentation
 - 1. Leave understanding the concept
 - 2. Understand the positive and negative ripple effects
 - 3. We'll be here til the building closes
 - ATMS intended to replace the officer on Lindvog
 - Detection loops buried in the pavement will give a signal to not send more cars down
 - When both loops clear, signal to send more cars down.
 - Halfway between WA and Ohio will be the measurement place
 - License plate readers at Lindvog and the toll booth. If you don't go through both, you get sent back
 - Barber Cutoff will be the spot where people who live in town will have to reroute
 - Continuous or noncontinuous—back and forth on that.
 - If non-continuous, they'll be working with WSF app to understand usage and communicate with the world about whether the system is on

- QUESTIONS:

- Comment from Commissioner Rolfes: purpose of this project is not to make it easier for ferry traffic to get to the terminal, it's for the chaos to be outside of the town center
- Comment from Tim Davis: ATMS is mid-engineering. Needs to happen soon. The rest will be years. And it's independent from the realignment which will take more time. Focus on ATMS
- QUESTION: if traffic goes beyond BC, there's no shoulder?
 - A: Correct.
- BETH BERGLUND: Appreciates the willingness to be flexible. Key conflict is going to be the schools. Saturday, Sunday, holiday would be the simplest
 - A: acknowledging John Vezina and ferry staff.
- QUESTION: However this operates, it needs to align with how people are going to behave. If you create a system that isn't logical, people will ignore it and the toll booth clerk will be the arbiter
- QUESTION: Can we get good signs and markings? 104 sign near BC-make sure they say "holding lane in effect" (variable signage) in all of the places where necessary



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- COMMENT: Helps to go on WSF site to find out how long of a wait there is. Encourages cameras for the different points of congestion.
- QUESTION: design deadline—does that include signs?
 - A: Yes. But adjustments possible as the federal and state people
 - Signage is easier to change but location of sign will not. She will not download an app. Tourists don't know what's going on.
 - A: Tim-signs are great but they are better to be static because it's so hard to pay for variable signs. Always referring people to the wsdot website, which is the best way.
 - A: John Vezina: WS Ferries. Thanks us for the tenor of the conversation.
 Commissioner Rolfes collaborates a lot. He's heard from the community loud and clear. They want to be good neighbors but terminal staff cannot be arbitrators. Needs to support the community but not put the burden on our staff. Terminal staff can't be responsible for turning things on and off. Stressful to work at our terminal in the summer.
- QUESTION: Shiny new object. How much is it going to cost? Toll booth folks shouldn't be referees. Lindvog can get plugged up. People can be "poo poo heads".
 - A: no plan to turn this into a tolled system.
- ZOOM QUESTION: encourages non-continuous operations. Motorcycles should be able to go through and not wait.
- ZOOM QUESTION: Is this used in anywhere else?
 - A: No.
- ZOOM QUESTION: Can this not be routed through a school zone?
- QUESTION: Can the fast ferry run more?
