Meeting Called to Order at: 6:32 p.m.

Reading of the Land Acknowledgment: We would like to begin by acknowledging that the land on which we gather is within the ancestral territory of the "People of Clear Salt Water" (Suquamish People). Expert fishermen, canoe builders and basket weavers, the Suquamish live in harmony with the lands and waterways along Washington's Central Salish Sea as they have for thousands of years. Here, the Suquamish live and protect the land and waters of their ancestors for future generations as promised by the Point Elliott Treaty of 1855. "Every part of this soil is sacred in the estimation of my people. Every hillside, every valley, every plain and grove, has been hallowed by some sad or happy event in days long vanished." Chief Seattle 1854.

Presentation on Kitsap County's recycling program - Lauren Liming, Kitsap County Public Works - Solid Waste Division

- Recycling JMK Fibers Recycling
 - Manually sorting
 - By humans
 - Mechanical sorting:
 - Screens
 - Air
 - Gravity
 - Magnets
 - Eddy current
 - "Intelligent" sorting:
 - Optical
- Successful recycling depends on:
 - Sorting technology
 - Recycling markets
 - Regional alignment
 - Recycling right
- China was at the heart of the global waste business but in 2018 enacted its National Sword Policy which banned the import of most plastics and other materials headed for that nation's recycling processors, which had handled nearly half of the world's recyclable waste for the past quarter century.
- Kitsap made changes to recycling no more milk and juice cartons, no frozen food boxes (because it is coated in plastic), no twist caps. <u>HANDY REFERENCE</u> GUIDE.
- Plastic bottles
 - Ignore recycle symbols
 - No lids
- How to Recycle Right:
 - Empty, clean & dry
 - Recycle only what is on your guide if in doubt, DO NOT recycle it
 - Keep recyclables loose, no plastic bags
- Curbside Compost Service now available in North Kitsap
- Adopt a Spot Litter Cleanup

- Mark –lack of investment and industry is hurting our recycling efforts
- Martha recycle plastic bags at the grocery stores
- Emily does it matter if we crush cans? Encouraged not to but if you're trying to conserve space (such as on a boat) go ahead and do so. Greasy pizza boxes can go into compost bins; How do we get more items on the EPR Program list? Changing policy, call your representatives
- Laurie Restrict single-use plastic? Central Market Take Out now uses compostable containers. Have to send compostable items to compost facilities.

 Top Concerns - air quality, wildfire, climate change, sea level, earthquakes and temperatures
 - Things people can do on their own properties make sure your gutters are clear, weather-proofing house,
 - Most important services emergency health care, elder care, food security
 - Map Your Neighborhood Tribe hoping to deploy a task force in 2023
 - Any interest from SCAC members? Brynn is interested.
 - Suquamish Ham Radio Club
 - Do we have an emergency shelter in the community? Brynn wasn't aware of one.
