Meeting called to order at 6:35 PM

Land Acknowledgement was read.

Kitsap County Staff: James Bunn, Kitsap County Commissioner's Office

Community Members: Eight were present, as well as Suquamish Fire Department Chief Rick La Grandeur

- Introductions were made by Council members
- **Initial Public Comments**: Question was asked about Suquamish development, but was deferred until Scott Crowell's presentation

Other comments: James mentioned that the restoration of the Sports Court is being planned and the work should begin in a year or so depending upon funding; Tom stated that speeding on Suquamish Way continues to be a problem

- Commissioner's Comments: Commissioner Rolfes was not present
- Ongoing or Old Business
 - o Minutes from the May and June SCAC meetings were approved.
 - Planning for the August 9 SCAC Community Picnic was conducted: Ed and Martha are the chief planners, setup will start at 10:00 AM, and Patty was thanked for suggesting sending out postcards about the picnic.
 - o A reminder was made about the Stormwater Treatment System that will be installed between Augusta and Angeline Avenues starting in August, 2025.
 - o SCAC Workplan: Tom said he will be talking to the Suquamish Public Works Director about the speeding problem on Suquamish Way.

Guest Presentation

Scott Crowell, Director of the Suquamish Tribe Department of Community Development, gave an overview of the activities of his department.

- They perform community and development planning, new construction, economic development, and construct Tribal housing, facilities and public utilities.
- Examples of past projects include townhouses in Suquamish Shores, developed lots on Snooker Lane, the House of Awakened Culture, the Suquamish Dock and Museum, and Legacy and Waterfront Parks.
- Examples of current projects include a new learning center, an expansion of the Tribal Clinic and a cooperative project with the County to construct the above-mentioned Stormwater Treatment System.
- o Examples of future projects include additional Tribal housing, expanded health programs, and parks.

Questions and Answers: Patty --- Does the Tribe work with other groups to protect the environment? Scott --- the Tribe works with the County and has recently purchased another 200 acres of Land; Ed --- Does the Tribe provide services to housing? Scott, Yes, possibly internet;

New Business ---Year of The Rural --- Patty Charnas

- o A workshop was held in Kingston on YTR which dealt primarily with zoning changes in rural areas of Kitsap County.
- The primary issue was agriculture in rural areas, as well as the placement of childcare facilities.
- The placement of AUDs in rural areas is also a concern to the Tribes.
- The potential installation of energy storage facilities in rural areas was discussed.

Public Comments

• Mary Gleysteen, a member of the Kingston Affordable Housing Working Group, which is part of Kingston Cares, announced that they will be having a meeting on August 13 at 6:30 PM at Village Green to provide an overview of the group's efforts towards affordable housing in the Kingston area.

Meeting was adjourned at 7:50 PM.

The next meeting will be September 4 at 6:30pm at the UCC Church, 18732 Division Ave. NE. Increases in sewer rates will be discussed.
