2016 Kitsap Homeless Housing Plan

1. Make homelessness rare.

Prevent homelessness whenever possible.

2. Make homelessness brief.

Respond to the crisis of homelessness immediately to get people inside.

3. Make homelessness <u>one-time</u>.

Help people move into appropriate permanent housing and ensure they can maintain their housing.

4. Continuously improve our homeless <u>response system</u>.

Improve capacity, coordination, & efficiency.

5. Expand community engagement.

Develop partnerships with the community.


Discussion Groups:

- Preserve and create affordable housing units
- Prioritize serving people who are unsheltered and/or those who are chronically homeless
- Increase funding for affordable housing units and programs that remedy homelessness
- Integrate planning for homelessness and affordable housing with other planning efforts.



People become unsheltered because.....

- Poverty puts many at a high risk of becoming homeless.
- The cost of housing is growing rapidly.
- The supply of affordable housing is low.



The Scope of the Problem in Kitsap


1 in 150 individuals in Kitsap County experienced homelessness in 2016

205 individuals were counted as unsheltered in a 24-hour period

During 2016, **1733** individuals lived unsheltered

Goals from the Workshop

- Establish the Affordable Housing Task Force
- Explore alternative housing, such as boarding houses & tiny houses
 (20 people in housing modules in 6 months)
- Form crisis response teams
- Propose a "demonstration" program to attract state & federal funders



Tiny Cottage Villages: a safe, secure and very affordable housing model




Goal: Develop a successful model to expand countywide

Tiny Cottage Villages Provide Many Advantages

- A sense of community
- Safety for residents and neighbors
- Sanitation and waste management
- Connection to supportive and property management services

- Access to public transportation
- Self-governance and tenant rules
 No drugs or alcohol
- Tenant application screening
- Village population: homeless families and singles
