If you know someone who just turned 18 or is newly eligible to vote, now is a great time to help them get registered. If they are 17 but will be 18 by the November General Election, they can vote in the Primary's candidate races.

Voting is easy and accessible in Kitsap County. You can return your ballot by mail or use one of our secure drop boxes — no stamp required for either. We'll also have vote centers open August 2, August 4 and Election Day, August 5.

Thank you for taking the time to be an informed voter. When we all participate, we all benefit.

Your Right to Privacy

Every voter has the right to vote his or her ballot in secret.

Unqualified Voting

Attempting to vote when not qualified, or falsely signing the Voter Declaration, is a felony punishable by up to five years of imprisonment or a maximum fine of \$10,000, or both.

Questions or Need a Replacement Ballot?

If you don't receive your ballot by **July 24**, or if your ballot is damaged or lost, request a replacement ballot by contacting Kitsap County Elections at (360) 307-VOTE (8683) or auditor@kitsap.gov.

Military, Overseas and Early Ballots

If you are a military or overseas voter or if you believe your ballot will not be received in time to vote, you may request to receive your ballot by email or request an early ballot up to 90 days before an election. Early ballots list only the contests known at the time of the request. To request an email ballot or early ballot, visit:

Kitsap County Elections is not responsible for the content of statements or their factual and grammatical accuracy.

Participating Jurisdictions

Districts participating in this Local Voters' Pamphlet are the State of Washington, the City of Bainbridge Island, the City of Bremerton, the Bremerton School District No. 100, the North Kitsap School District No. 400, and the Kitsap Rural Library District dba Kitsap Regional Library.

Statement Standards

Candidates for State Offices

The Washington Secretary of State does not print a Primary voters' pamphlet, so Kitsap County includes statements from Legislative candidates in our Primary pamphlet as a courtesy to Kitsap County voters. Legislative statements are submitted by candidates to the Secretary of State's Office where they are reviewed. Laws for the State Voters' Pamphlet do not permit the Secretary of State's Office to disallow or censor content. The statements for Legislative candidates are printed here as approved by the Secretary of State's Office. If you object to a candidate's statement, please direct your comments to the candidate.

Candidates for County Offices

Statements for candidates for county races are subject to RCW 29A.32 sections 210-280 and Kitsap County Administrative Rules. Once deemed compliant they are printed exactly as submitted. Kitsap County Elections does not correct punctuation, grammar, typos or inaccurate information.

Election Information

Top 2 Primary

The purpose of the Primary is to reduce the number of candidates in each race to two for the General Election. Voters may vote for any one candidate in each contest.

The two candidates who receive the most votes in the August Primary advance to the General Election. Candidates must receive at least 1 percent of the total votes cast for their position in order to be placed on the General Election ballot.

Partisan Offices – Primary

A Primary is held if one or more candidates file for a partisan position. There is one partisan race in Kitsap County in the 2025 Primary. Ballot order was determined by a lot draw conducted at the Secretary of State's Office.

Nonpartisan Offices - Primary

A Primary is held if three or more candidates file for a nonpartisan position. If no more than two candidates file, they appear only on the General Election ballot in the order determined by lot draw.

Write-Ins – Which Votes Can Be Counted

Primary write-in votes can only be tallied if:

- The candidate filed a Declaration of Write-in Candidacy, and
- If there are enough write-in votes for a candidate to come in second.

Vote Centers and Accessible Voting

Federal law requires jurisdictions to provide a vote centers with certified accessible voting devices that enable voters with disabilities to cast their ballots independently and in private.


Accessible Voting Units provide all contests in audio and high-contrast text formats and are available beginning 18 days prior to the Primary.

Online Ballot Access/ Braille Voters' Pamphlets

The State of Washington provides an accessible online ballot and a Local Voters' Pamphlet at VoteWA.gov. Braille voter pamphlets are available by contacting us at (360) 307-VOTE (8683) or auditor@kitsap.gov.

The online access is compatible with commonly used accessibility software such as screen readers and screen magnifiers, and allows for navigation without the use of a mouse and without having to see the cursor on the screen. All candidate video statements include closed captions.

Register to Vote

Who May Vote

To be eligible to vote, one must register and be:

- A citizen of the United States.
- · A resident of Washington state.
- At least 18 years old. In the August Primary a 17-year-old who will be 18 by the November General Election can vote in candidate races, except for PCO races.
- Not disqualified from voting due to a court order.
- Not currently serving a sentence of total confinement in prison under the jurisdiction of the Department of Corrections for a Washington felony conviction.
- Not currently incarcerated for a federal or out-ofstate felony conviction.

When to Register

Individuals may register to vote at any time. To vote in the August 5 Primary, the deadlines are:

- July 28: Deadline for mail and online voter registrations, updates and changes.
- August 5: In-person deadline for voter registrations, updates and changes. Citizens may register until 8 p.m. on Election Day by appearing in person at one of the Vote Centers or at the Auditor's Office. Registration will also be available the Saturday and Monday before Election Day and on Election Day at the Vote Centers at the Marvin Williams Recreation Center, the Poulsbo Fire Station and the Kitsap County Auditor's Office.

Options for Registering

- Online at <u>www.VoteWA.gov.</u>
- Complete a paper registration form available at libraries, city halls, public schools, fire district offices and at the County Auditor's Office.
- When you renew your driver's license.

Update Your Voter Record if You Move

If you are already registered to vote in Washington, update your voter record through July 28:

- online at: www.VoteWA.gov
- by emailing the Kitsap County Auditor Elections Division at <u>auditor@kitsap.gov</u>,
- by phone at 360-307-VOTE(8683).

Address updates can be made in person until 8 p.m. on Election Day at the Kitsap County Auditor's Office and at the Vote Centers. Dates and locations are on Page 2. A new voter registration card will be mailed after your address change is processed.

To Cancel Your Voter Registration

You may sign a form requesting to cancel your registration. In the case of a deceased voter, a friend or family member may sign a form authorizing a cancellation. The form is available by contacting the Kitsap County Auditor's Office or online at https://www.kitsap.gov/auditor/Documents/ CancellationForm.pdf.

Name Change

If you have legally changed your name, you must complete a new voter registration application. Your new signature is used to validate your ballot.

Has my ballot been counted?

Mark Your Ballot

How to vote

Use a dark blue or black ink pen to completely fill in the box to the left of your choice.

Do not use pencil.

Mark one choice in each contest. If you mark more than one choice, no votes will be counted for that contest.

Secure

Place the voted ballot in the secrecy sleeve.

Place the secrecy sleeve inside the lavender return envelope.



Read, sign and date the Voter Declaration on the lavender return envelope.

- You must sign the lavender return envelope in order for your ballot to be counted.
- Sign your name in dark ink.
- Seal the lavender return envelope.

Ballot Marking Tips and Reminders

Ballot marking errors require additional staff review, which slows down ballot processing. Help us improve efficiency by avoiding these common errors:





The Board of Trustees of Kitsap Regional Library adopted Resolution 2025/03 concerning its regular property tax levy. This proposition authorizes an increase to the District's levy from \$0.27 to \$0.39 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation, to be collected in 2026. This funding is necessary to sustain public library operations and services. The new levy amount would be used to compute the limitations for subsequent levies as provided by chapter RCW 84.55.

Explanatory Statement

(Prepared by the attorney for the district as prescribed by law.)

Kitsap Regional Library relies on property tax revenue for 96% of its budget. Under state law, the Library's property tax revenue can only increase by 1% annually unless approved by voters. This has not kept pace with inflation or increased costs to operate and provide services.

Proposition 1 would authorize the Library to reset its regular property tax levy from \$0.27 to \$0.39 per \$1,000 of assessed value in 2026. This rate is below the State-authorized maximum of \$0.50 per \$1,000 of assessed value, and below the \$0.43 per \$1,000 of assessed value approved by voters in 2017. The estimated annual increase for a home valued at \$500,000 is \$60. The new levy amount would be used to calculate all applicable tax limitations thereafter.

Revenue from this levy would allow the Library to continue current operations of nine locations and mobile services. It would support open hours, access to collections—including books, eBooks, and audiobooks—and programs including early literacy, after-school learning, and technology access. It will support the maintenance of library facilities but will not fund the construction of any libraries.

If the Proposition is not approved, reductions in library services and delayed maintenance may occur beginning in 2026.
