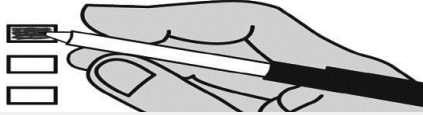

**How to vote this ballot**

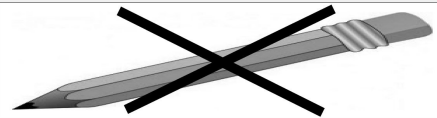

**Referendum Measure No. 90**  
 The legislature passed Engrossed Substitute Senate Bill 5395 concerning comprehensive sexual health education. This bill would require school districts to adopt or develop, consistent with state standards, comprehensive age-appropriate sexual health education, as defined, for all students, and excuse students if their parents request. Should this bill be:

**Advisory Vote No. 32**  
**Engrossed Substitute Senate Bill 5323**  
 The legislature imposed, without a vote of the people, a retail sales tax on pass-through charges retail establishments collect for specified carryout bags, costing \$32,000,000 in its first ten years, for government spending. This tax increase should be:

**Advisory Vote No. 33**

**Substitute Senate Bill 5628**  
 The legislature imposed, without a vote of the people, a tax on heavy equipment rentals to consumers by heavy equipment rental property dealers, costing \$103,000,000 in its first ten years, for government spending. This tax increase should be:

**Advisory Vote No. 34**

**Engrossed Substitute Senate Bill 6492**  
 The legislature increased, without a vote of the people, the business and occupation tax rate for certain businesses, while reducing certain surcharges, costing \$843,000,000 in its first ten years, for government spending. This tax increase should be:

**Advisory Vote No. 35**

**Engrossed Senate Bill 6690**  
 The legislature increased, without a vote of the people, the business and occupation tax on manufacturers of commercial airplanes, including components or tooling, costing \$1,024,000,000 in its first ten years, for government spending. This tax increase should be:

**Proposed Constitutional Amendment**

**Engrossed Senate Joint Resolution No. 8212**

The legislature has proposed a constitutional amendment on investment of public funds. This amendment would allow public money held in a fund for long-term care services and supports to be invested by governments as authorized by state law, including investments in private stocks. <b>Local Measures Fire Districts</b>
<b>Central Kitsap Fire and Rescue Proposition No. 1 Bonds for Fire Stations</b>
The Board of Commissioners of Central Kitsap Fire and Rescue adopted Resolution 20-05, concerning emergency services facilities to protect public health, life, and property. This proposition would allow the District to strategically combine and replace five fire stations, remodel four fire stations, and perform related capital improvements to better protect the community, improve response times, seismically upgrade fire stations, acquire equipment, improve operational efficiencies, and provide firefighters a healthier, safer work environment; issue no more than \$58,300,000 of general obligation bonds maturing within 20 years; and levy annual excess property taxes to pay these bonds, pursuant to Resolution 20-05. <b>Kitsap County Fire Protection District No. 7 (South Kitsap Fire and Rescue) Proposition No. 1</b>
<b>Capital Facilities Bonds - \$39,500,000</b>
The Board of Fire Commissioners of Kitsap County Fire Protection District No. 7 adopted Resolution No. 2020-06 concerning this proposition for bonds. This proposition would authorize the District to combine and replace five fire stations with three new fire stations, remodel the headquarters campus and make seismic upgrades to stations throughout the District, to issue \$39,500,000 of general obligation bonds maturing within a maximum of twenty years, and to collect excess property taxes annually to repay the bonds, as provided in Resolution No. 2020-06.
