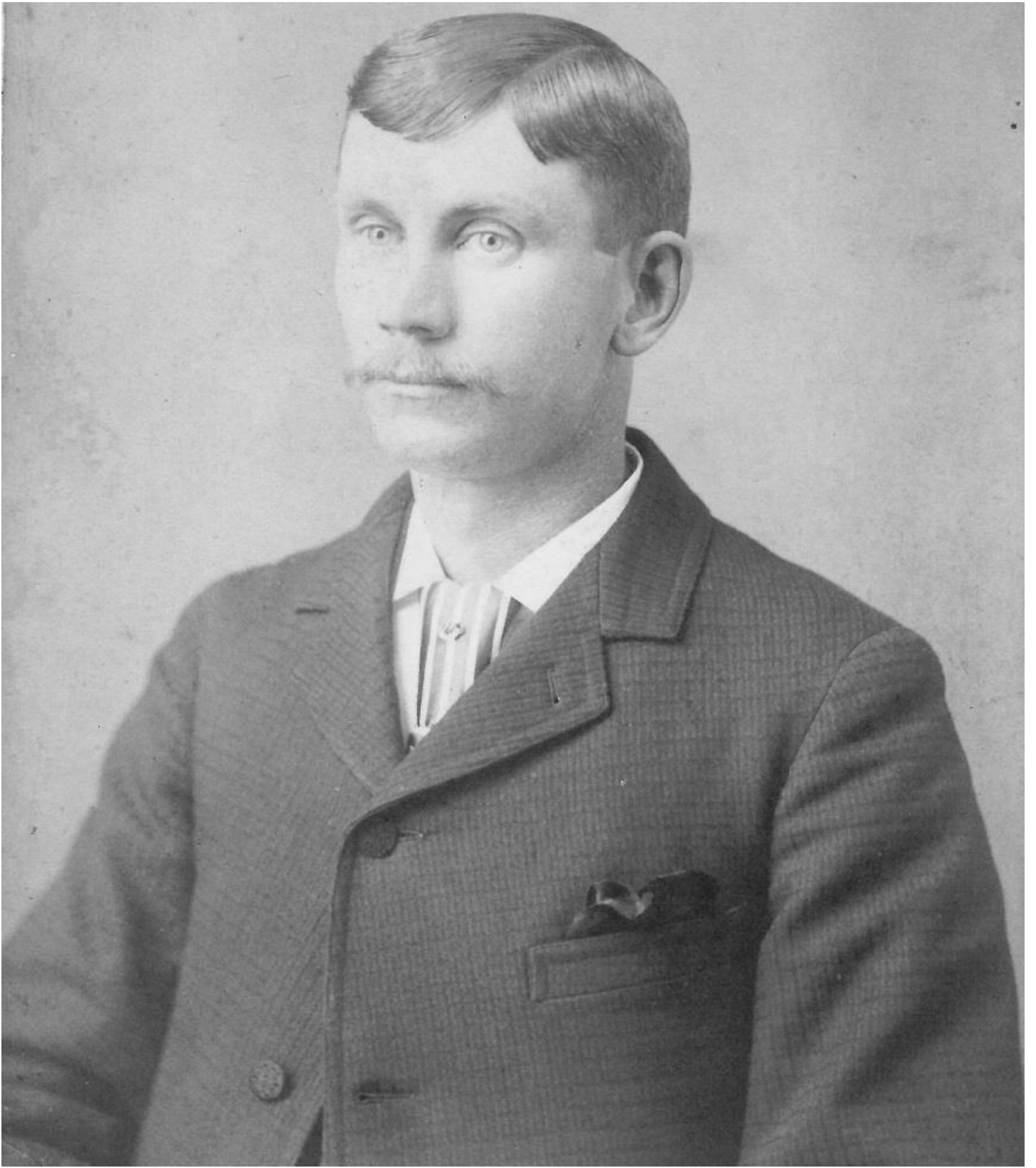


Edward Jones

PIONEER AUDITOR DIES AFTER LONG SERVICE

Funeral For Edward Jones Probably Will Be Held Here On Wednesday

Edward F. Jones, deputy state auditor for the past 18 years passed away Sunday at a Seattle hospital. Mr. Jones had been in poor health for several months having gone to Seattle for treatment about ten days ago. He was born at Lafayette, Ill., September 24, 1860 and came to eastern Washington in 1882, returning to Lafayette in 1884 where he married Mary A. Redfield on December 18, 1894. Upon his return to this state he located in western Washington, coming to Olympia in 1907 and assuming duties of deputy state auditor filling that position until his death.

He was an active member of the Capitol Camp Knights of Pythis and Woodman of the World, and a member of the United churches.

Funeral services will be held in Olympia, probably tomorrow afternoon, for Edward F. Jones, deputy state auditor for the last eighteen years, who died in a Seattle hospital Sunday.
