# Request for Qualifications SILVERDALE STORMWATER PARK

# 1.0 OBJECTIVE

Kitsap County Department of Public Works – Stormwater Division (KCPW) is soliciting Request for Qualifications (RFQ) from qualified firms with stormwater park design experience. Specialties involved in the design phase of this Washington Department of Ecology (Ecology) funded project include Civil Engineering including stormwater modeling Landscape Design, and Regulatory Permit Processing. The selected firm may be retained in future phases of the project to assist KCPW during bidding and construction.

# 2.0 BACKGROUND AND AGENCY NEEDS

Kitsap County desires to site a regional stormwater treatment facility with community amenities (stormwater park) on an 0.8-acre Kitsap County-owned property located at the corner of Bucklin Hill Road and Tracyton Boulevard in the community of Silverdale. This facility would provide treatment for approximately 70-acres of public roads and urban development. Stormwater from existing conveyance systems would be directed to the treatment site, and treated stormwater would discharge to an existing downstream County conveyance system and outfall to the Clear Creek estuary and Dyes Inlet.

The park would provide both water quality and community park/open space benefits. The facility may include public amenities/elements such as pedestrian paths, covered shelters, stormwater art or educational elements, and/or open landscaped green space. It is the goal of KCPW to maximize both community park and water quality elements, consistent with the County's *Water as a Resource* policy

A previous planning effort funded by the Puget Sound Regional Council (PSRC) provides a preliminary evaluation of the site and a range of conceptual treatment options. This planning effort generally describes the contributing basin, site conditions and potential design concepts. Proposers should note that the information provided on the County's Project Pages website is preliminary and conceptual in nature and that additional site opportunities, constraints, and design options are expected to be evaluated in detail as part of the design contract. KCPW encourages proposers to explore/propose alternative design concepts that optimize the site's potential to meet project goals.

KCPW has obtained a grant from the Washington State Department of Ecology ("Ecology") to fund the design project. All deliverables associated with the project must therefore meet Ecology's most recent version of *Stormwater Design Deliverables Guidance* as well as the Kitsap County's *Stormwater Design Manual* (2021).

# 3.0 SCOPE OF WORK

The work to be performed by the Consultant consists of evaluating alternatives, and designing and developing Plans, Specifications and Estimate (PS&E) for a bid-ready project for a

stormwater park facility on Kitsap County-owned property at the southwest corner of Bucklin Hill Road and Tracyton Boulevard in Silverdale. The general scope of work for the project includes:

- Site assessment including survey, environmental and geotechnical evaluation. (Some preliminary survey has been done.)
- Develop and evaluate preliminary design alternatives.
- Prepare Design Report pursuant to Ecology and Kitsap County technical requirements, including 30% design and cost estimates.
- Provide cultural resources review pursuant to Ecology grant requirements.
- Provide environmental documentation and permitting pursuant to Kitsap County code and Ecology grant requirements,
- Prepare 60% PS&E.
- Prepare 90% PS&E.
- Prepare bid-ready PS&E and complete contract bidding documents.
- Provide support to Kitsap County-led public outreach.
- Provide engineering services support during the bidding process and during construction.

All prospective consultants are advised that this is an Ecology-funded project and will be held to applicable sections of the most recent *Water Quality Combined Funding Program Guidelines*. Consultants will also be held to the ADA and Civil Rights language of Kitsap County.

# 4.0 ESTIMATE AND SCHEDULE

Kitsap County anticipates the costs of the consulting services for this project to be approximately **\$400,000** (exclusive of possible future construction support and testing). The estimated time period for this work will be from approximately June 2024 through end of August2025.

# 5.0 CONSULTANT SELECTION PROCESS

It is the County's intent to select a consultant based on the qualifications and abilities of the firm/team and key project individuals, and the team's approach to the project. Proposers may be individual firms or teams as appropriate to meet the specific needs of the project. Proposers are solely responsible for all costs incurred in the development and submission of the response statement to this RFQ or any other presentations whether in response to this RFQ or to any subsequent requirements of the consultant selection and contract negotiation process.

To be considered responsive to this RFQ the Consultant must follow the directions presented in this solicitation and include the information required.

# 5.01 PROCUREMENT SCHEDULE AND GENERAL GUIDELINES

The procurement schedule shown in Table 1 on the following page outlines the tentative schedule for important action dates and times. All dates after the qualification submission due date are approximate and may be adjusted as conditions indicate, without amending this document. It is the Responder's sole responsibility to periodically check the County's website for amendments to this document.

Submissions' must be prepared and submitted no later than the submission date and time specified in the Procurement Schedule. The Submission is to be sent to the Procurement Coordinator either by mail, email (preferred) or hand/mail delivered.

# 5.02 SUBMISSION SUBMITTAL CONTENT

The Submission submittal package shall include the following information at a minimum:

**<u>Cover Letter.</u>** The cover letter is limited to one page and shall include:

- The firm/consultant's name and a contact person with name, title, mailing address, email address, phone number.
- Name and title of the proposed project manager (if not the contact person) and his/her contact information (mailing address, e-mail address and phone number)

**<u>Project Team.</u>** Description of firms and people that will work on the project and their respective roles and experience. If sub-consultants will be used, identification of the proposed firm(s) and information on their experience, qualification, responsible personnel, and anticipated responsibilities.

**<u>Project Experience.</u>** Description of relevant/similar projects completed including period of performance, owner and fee.

**<u>Project Technical Approach.</u>** Description of the proposed technical approach to the project including a tentative timeline for project completion.

<u>**Project Management Approach.**</u> Description of proposed communication processes, scope/schedule/budget control, and approach to quality control.

**<u>References.</u>** References and contact information for at least three (3) current or former customers with service needs and/or programs similar in size and scope to Kitsap County

Any additional information the Offeror feels addresses the selection criteria.

The Submission is limited to 30 pages  $(8\frac{1}{2}x11)$  and shall be inclusive of any cover letter, resumes/bios, photos, graphics, etc.

#### 5.04 CONTRACT TERM

Services are expected to begin in June 2024 with project completion by August 31st, 2025.

#### 5.05 ACCEPTANCE/REJECTION OF RESPONSES

The County reserves the right and holds at its discretion the following rights and options:

- to waive any or all informalities in any RFQ.
- to reject any or all responses.
- to issue subsequent requests.

This RFQ solicitation does not commit the County to enter into a contract or proceed with the procurement of the project. The County assumes no obligations, responsibilities and liabilities, fiscal or otherwise, to reimburse all or part of the costs incurred by the parties responding to this RFQ. All such costs shall be borne by each company submitting an RFQ response.

# 5.06 ADDENDUMS TO THE RFQ

Any revisions, updates, clarifications, of the RFQ will be posted on the County's webpage at: <u>https://www.kitsap.gov/das/Pages/Online-Bids.aspx</u> and Proposers are encouraged to periodically check for project updates.

# 6.0 CONSULTANT EVALUATION PROCESS

A team of project stakeholders will evaluate Submissions, and conduct interviews according to the consultant evaluation criteria and the three-part process described below:

Part 1

Evaluation of the Submissions submitted by each Proposer, resulting in a short-listing of Proposers who will be invited to an interview. Proposers will be notified if they have been selected for an interview or not.

Part 2

Interviews will be conducted, and Proposers will be evaluated on the interview in addition to the written Submission for a combined final score.

Part 3

The evaluation team makes a recommendation to the Public Works Director to obtain approval to begin negotiations with the selected Proposer. Contract negotiations shall then commence with the selected Proposer. Proposers not selected will be notified of the selection outcome. If the selected Proposer and the County are unable to agree on the final scope and fee for the design services for the contract, the County reserves the right to terminate the negotiations with the selected Proposer and initiate contract negotiations with the next highest-rated Proposer.

# 6.01 EVALUATION CRITERIA

Submissions will be evaluated and ranked based on the criteria listed in Table 2 on the following page. The County reserves the right to give each criterion such weight as it deems appropriate.

# 6.02 INTERVIEWS

Following evaluation of the Submissions, the highest-ranking firms will be invited to participate in the interview process. The County will notify Proposers as soon as possible for scheduling of interviews. The project manager will schedule interviews with the contact person provided in the Submission. Additional interview information will be provided at the time of the invitation. Interviews will be held virtually. The intent of the interviews is to help clarify and verify information provided in the Submission and to give the evaluation team an opportunity to meet the project manager and key personnel that will have direct involvement with the project and to learn more about their relevant experience and expertise.

# 7.0 CONTRACT NEGOTIATION PROCESS

Negotiation of the detailed Scope of Work for this project will follow final selection. It is expected that this will be a time and materials, not to exceed contract with negotiated rates.

# APPENDIX A: PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT

#### CONTRACT NO. Professional Services Contract (SAMPLE)

This Professional Services Contract ("Contract") is between Kitsap County, a Washington state political subdivision, having its principal offices at 614 Division Street, Port Orchard, Washington 98366 ("County") and [Contractor Name], a [Contractor Type], having its principal offices at [Contractor Address] ("Contractor").

WHEREAS, the County desires to use budgeted monies to pay for professional civil engineering and geotechnical services, on-call and as needed by the Department.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing recitals which are incorporated herein by

reference, and the terms and conditions set forth below, the parties agree as follows:

# SECTION 1. TERM AND EFFECTIVE DATE

1.1 The Contract will become effective [Contract Start Date] and terminate [Contract End Date], unless terminated or extended. The Contract may be extended for additional consecutive terms at the mutual agreement of the parties, not to exceed a total of [Contract Length]. In no event will the Contract become effective unless and until it is approved and executed by the duly authorized representative of Kitsap County.

# SECTION 2. SERVICES

- 2.1. <u>Scope of Work</u>. The Contractor shall provide all "Services" identified in Attachment A: (Scope of Work), which is incorporated herein by reference. The Contractor shall provide its own equipment, labor, and materials.
- 2.2. <u>Contract</u>. "Contract" means this Contract and any exhibits, amendments, and solicitation documents accepted by the County, and the following Attachments A (Scope of Work) and B (Compensation).
- 2.3. <u>Personnel</u>. The Contractor shall have and maintain complete responsibility for its Personnel. "Personnel" means Contractor and Contractor's employees, subcontractors, volunteers, interns, agents, and any other person utilized by the Contractor directly or indirectly or through third parties to perform any Services under the Contract. The Contractor shall promptly remove any Personnel performing Services on request from the County Representative.

- 2.4. <u>Standards</u>. The Contractor warrants that i) Contractor has the qualifications, knowledge, experience, skills, and resources necessary to provide all Services; ii) all Services shall be provided by Personnel experienced in their respective fields and in a manner consistent with the standards of care, skill, diligence, and knowledge commonly possessed and exercised by experienced professionals in the same discipline in the same or similar circumstances; and iii) all Services shall be performed to the County's reasonable satisfaction and according to the schedule agreed to by the parties.
- 2.5. <u>Communication</u>. The Contractor shall keep the County informed of the progress of the Services in the manner, method, and intervals requested by the County.

### SECTION 3. COMPENSATION AND PAYMENT

- 3.1. <u>Compensation</u>. The maximum amount of compensation paid under the Contract by the County shall not exceed \$[Contract Amount]. A description of the compensation is provided in Attachment B: Compensation, which is incorporated herein by reference.
- 3.2. <u>Invoice</u>. The Contractor will submit one invoice to the County month, no later than the 15<sup>th</sup> day following the end of each month, for payment of Services completed to date, unless otherwise provided herein. Each invoice shall identify the Services performed, dates performed, and any other information requested by the County.
- 3.3. <u>Payment</u>. The County will make reasonable efforts to pay the Contractor within thirty (30) days from the date the County receives a complete and correct invoice, unless otherwise provided herein. All funds disbursed to the Contractor will be processed by Direct Deposit via Automated Clearing House (ACH), unless otherwise agreed to by the parties.
- 3.4. <u>Insurance/W-9 Compliance</u>. All payments are expressly conditioned upon the Contractor's compliance with all insurance requirements and submission of a current IRS W-9 form to the County. Payments may be suspended in full in the event of noncompliance. Upon full compliance, payments will be released to the Contractor unless otherwise provided herein.
- 3.5. <u>Restrictions</u>. The Contractor will only be entitled to receive payment for Services expressly authorized in the Contract and received during the Contract term and accepted by the County. The Contractor acknowledges oral requests and approvals of additional services or additional compensation are prohibited and unenforceable. Advance payments are not authorized.
- 3.6. <u>Certification</u>. By signing this Contract, the parties certify that each understands that this Contract is funded in whole or part with ARPA Funds and subject to all ARPA Rules, and other laws, and requirements associated with federally funded programs now in effect and as amended, and the parties agree to comply with the same.

#### SECTION 4. TERMINATION

4.1. <u>For Convenience</u>. The County may terminate the Contract, in whole or in part, without penalty, for any reason or no reason, with ten days prior notice to the Contractor.

- 4.2. <u>Termination for Default</u>. The County may immediately terminate the Contract, in whole or part, due to the failure of the Contractor to comply with any Contract term or condition, or to make satisfactory progress in performing the Contract, subject to the provisions of 11.1, or if the County determines the Contractor has been debarred, suspended or otherwise lawfully prohibited from participating in any public procurement activity. The Contractor shall immediately notify the County if the Contractor becomes suspended or debarred.
- 4.3. <u>Procedures</u>. Upon receipt of notice of termination, the Contractor shall stop all Services as directed in the notice, notify Personnel of the termination date, and minimize further costs. All goods, materials, documents, data, and reports prepared by the Contractor under the Contract shall become the property of, and delivered to, the County on demand. A final payment will be made to the Contractor only for Services performed and accepted by the County through the effective date of termination. No costs incurred after the effective date of the termination will be paid.

### SECTION 5. INDEMNIFICATION

- 5.1. To the fullest extent permitted by law, the Contractor shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless Kitsap County and its elected and appointed officials, officers, employees, and agents (collectively "Indemnitees") from and against all Claims resulting from or arising out of the performance of the Contract, whether such Claims arise from the acts, errors, or omissions of the Contractor, its Personnel, third parties, or Kitsap County, or anyone directly or indirectly employed by any of them or anyone for whose acts, errors, or omissions any of them may be liable. It is the specific intent of the parties that the Indemnitees shall, in all instances, except Claims arising from the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the Indemnitees, be indemnified by the Contractor from and against any and all Claims.
- 5.2. With regard to any Claim against any Indemnitee by any of the Contractor's Personnel, or anyone directly or indirectly employed by them, or anyone for whose acts they may be liable, the Contractor's indemnification obligation shall not be limited in any way by a limitation on the amount or type of damages, compensation, or benefits payable by or for the Contractor or Contractor's Personnel under workers compensation acts, disability benefit acts, or other employee benefit acts. Solely for the purposes of this indemnification provision, the Contractor expressly waives its immunity under Title 51 RCW (Industrial Insurance) and acknowledges this waiver was mutually negotiated by the parties.
- 5.3. <u>Architectural, Landscape Architectural, Engineering, or Land Geotechnical Services</u>. Should a court of competent jurisdiction determine the Contract is subject to RCW 4.24.115, then, in the event of liability for damages arising out of bodily injury to persons or damages to property caused by or resulting from the concurrent negligence of the Contractor and the County, its officers, officials, employees, and agents, the Contractor's liability hereunder, including the duty and cost to defend, will be only to the extent of the Contractor's negligence.

- 5.4. <u>Claim</u>. "Claim" means all losses, claims, suits, actions, liabilities, damages, demands, judgments, settlements, expenses, fines, or other liabilities of any kind or nature whatsoever, including without limitation, all costs including costs of Claim processing, investigation, reasonable attorneys' fees, and damages, for any personal or bodily injury, sickness, disease, disability, or death, or loss or damage to tangible or intangible business or property, including the loss of use. Claim includes any infringement of copyright, patent, trademark, or other proprietary rights of any third parties arising out of Contract performance or use by the County of materials furnished or work performed under the Contract.
- 5.5. Obligations/Notice of Claim. The County will provide the Contractor notice of the assertion of liability by a third party that may give rise to a Claim by County against the Contractor based on the indemnity contained herein. The Contractor shall respond to the County's tender of defense of a claim in writing within fourteen (14) calendar days from the notice date and will advise the County if the Contractor accepts or denies tender of the claim. The County may in its discretion withhold all or part of any payment due the Contractor under the Contract until the Contractor responds to such notice. The Contractor shall keep the County timely and fully informed through all stages of the defense and promptly respond to and comply with County's requests for information. The County at all times reserves the right but has no obligation to participate in the defense and settlement of any Claim. Such participation shall not constitute a waiver of the Contractor's indemnity and defense obligations under the Contract. The Contractor shall not settle or compromise any Claim in any manner that imposes any obligations upon the County without the prior written consent of the County. The Contractor shall promptly advise the County of any occurrence or information known to the Contractor that could reasonably result in a Claim against the County. The violation of any provisions of this Section, including improper refusal to accept tender, is a material breach.

# SECTION 6. INSURANCE

- 6.1. <u>Minimum Insurance Required</u>. The Contractor and its subcontractors, if any, shall procure and maintain, until all of the Contract obligations have been fully discharged, including any warranty period, all insurance required in this Section with an insurance company duly licensed in Washington State with an A.M. Best Company ratings of not less than A-VIII and a category rating of not less than "8", with policies and forms satisfactory to the County. Use of alternative insurers requires prior written approval from the County. Coverage limits shall be at minimum the limits identified in this Section, or the limits available under the policies maintained by the Contractor without regard to the Contract, whichever is greater.
- 6.2. <u>Professional Liability</u>. Not less than \$1,000,000 per claim and \$2,000,000 annual aggregate. Coverage will apply to liability for professional error, act or omission arising out of or in connection with the Contractor's Services under the Contract. The coverage shall not exclude bodily injury, property damage or hazards related to the work rendered as part of the Contract or within the scope of the Contractor's services under the Contract, including testing, monitoring, measuring operations or laboratory analysis where such Services are rendered under the Contract.

- 6.3. <u>Commercial General Liability ("CGL")</u>. Not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$2,000,000 annual aggregate. Coverage shall include personal injury, bodily injury, and property damage for premise-operations liability, products/completed operations, personal/advertising injury, contractual liability, independent contractor liability, and stop gap/employer's liability. Coverage shall not exclude or contain sub-limits less than the minimum limits required herein, without the prior written approval of the County. The certificate of insurance for the CGL policy shall expressly cover the indemnification obligations required by the Contract.
- 6.4. <u>Automobile Liability</u>.
  - Contractor shall maintain personal automobile insurance on all vehicles used for Contract purposes as required by law.
  - □ Not less than \$100,000 per occurrence and \$300,000 annual aggregate. If a personal automobile liability policy is used to meet this requirement, it must include a business rider and cover each vehicle to be used in the performance of the Contract. If Contractor will use non-owned vehicles in performance of the Contact, the coverage shall include owned, hired, and non-owned automobiles.
  - □ Not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$2,000,000 annual aggregate. Coverage shall include liability for any and all owned, hired, and non-owned vehicles. Coverage may be satisfied with an endorsement to the CGL policy.
- 6.5. <u>Umbrella or Excess Liability</u>. The Contactor may satisfy the minimum liability limits required for the CGL and Automobile Liability under an Umbrella or Excess Liability policy. There is no minimum per occurrence limit of liability under the Umbrella or Excess Liability; however, the annual aggregate limit shall not be less than the highest "Each Occurrence" limit for either CGL or Automobile Liability. The Contractor agrees to an endorsement naming the County as an additional insured as provided in this Section, unless the Umbrella or Excess Liability provides coverage on a "Follow-Form" basis.
- 6.6. <u>Workers' Compensation and Employer Liability</u>. If applicable, the Contractor shall maintain workers' compensation insurance as required under the Title 51 RCW (Industrial Insurance), for all Contractor's Personnel eligible for such coverage. If the Contract is for over \$50,000, then the Contractor shall also maintain employer liability coverage with a limit of not less than \$1,000,000.
- 6.7. <u>Primary, Non-Contributory Insurance/Subcontractors</u>. The Contractor's and its subcontractors' insurance policies and additional named insured endorsements will provide primary insurance coverage and be non-contributory. Any insurance or self-insurance programs maintained or participated in by the County will be excess and not contributory to such insurance policies. All Contractor's and its subcontractors' liability insurance policies must be endorsed to show as primary coverage. The Contractor shall include all subcontractors as insureds under its policies or shall furnish separate certificates and endorsements for each subcontractor. All subcontractors shall comply with all insurance and indemnification requirements herein.

- 6.8. <u>Review of Policy Provisions</u>. Upon request, the Contractor shall provide a full and complete copy of all requested insurance policies to the County. The County reserves the right without limitation, but has no obligation to revise any insurance requirement, or to reject any insurance policies that fail to meet the requirements of the Contract. The County also has the right, but no obligation to review and reject any proposed insurer providing coverage based upon the insurer's financial condition or licensing status in Washington. The County has the right to request and review the self-insurance retention limits and deductibles, and the Contractor's most recent annual financial reports and audited financial statements, as conditions of approval. Failure to demand evidence of full compliance with the insurance requirements or failure to identify any insurance deficiency shall not relieve the Contractor from, nor be construed or deemed a waiver, of its obligation to maintain all the required insurance at all times as required herein.
- 6.9. <u>Waiver of Subrogation</u>. In consideration of the Contract award, the Contractor agrees to waive all rights of subrogation against the County, its elected and appointed officials, officers, employees, and agents. This waiver does not apply to any policy that includes a condition that expressly prohibits waiver of subrogation by the insured or that voids coverage should the Contractor enter into a waiver of subrogation on a pre-loss basis.
- 6.10. <u>Additional Insured, Endorsement and Certificate of Insurance</u>. All required insurance coverage, other than the workers' compensation and professional liability, shall name the County, it's elected and appointed officials, officers, employees, and agents, as additional insureds and be properly endorsed for the full available limits of coverage maintained by Contractor and its subcontractors. Endorsement is not required if the Contractor is a self-insured government entity or insured through a government risk pool authorized by Washington State.

The Certificate of Insurance and endorsement shall identify the Contract number and shall require not less than thirty (30) days' prior notice of termination, cancellation, nonrenewal or reduction in coverage. At the time of execution, the Contractor shall provide the Certificate of Insurance, endorsement, and all insurance notices to: Risk Management Division, Kitsap County Department of Administrative Services, 614 Division Street, MS-7, Port Orchard, Washington 98366.

- 6.11. <u>General</u>. The coverage limits identified herein are minimum requirements only and will not in any manner limit or qualify the liabilities or obligations of the Contractor under the Contract. All insurance policy deductibles and self-insured retentions for policies maintained under the Contract shall be paid by the Contractor. Any failure to comply with reporting provisions of the policies shall not affect coverage provided to the County, its elected and appointed officials, officers, employees, or agents. The Contractor's insurance shall apply separately to each insured against whom a claim is made, or suit is brought, subject to the limits of the insurer's liability.
- 6.12. <u>Claims-Made</u>. If the Contractor's liability coverage is written as a claims-made policy, the Contractor shall purchase an extended-reporting period or "tail" coverage for a minimum of three (3) years following completion of the performance or attempted performance of the provisions of this Contract.

#### SECTION 7. NOTICE AND CONTRACT REPRESENTATIVES

7.1. Any notices, demands and other communications required by the Contract will be effective if personally served upon the other party or if mailed by registered or certified mail, postage prepaid, return receipt requested, to the other party's Contract Representative at the address below. Notice may also be given by facsimile with the original to follow by regular mail. Notice will be deemed to be given three (3) days following the date of mailing, or immediately if personally served. For service by facsimile, service will be effective at the beginning of the next working day. Each party will designate a "Contract Representative", which may be changed by providing fifteen (15) days prior notice to the other party.

#### SECTION 8. AMENDMENTS, SUBCONTRACTS, INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR

- 8.1. <u>Amendment</u>. No amendment or modification to the Contract will be effective without the prior written consent of the authorized representatives of the parties.
- 8.2. <u>Successors and Assigns</u>. To the extent permitted by law, the Contract is binding on the parties' respective partners, successors, assigns, executors, and legal representatives.
- 8.3. <u>Assignments</u>. Except with the prior written consent of the other party, each party shall not assign or transfer, including by merger (whether that party is the surviving or disappearing entity), consolidation, dissolution, or operation of law any right, duty, obligation, or remedy under the Contract. Any purported assignment or transfer in violation of this section shall be void.
- 8.4. <u>Subcontracts</u>. The Contractor shall provide the County a list of all subcontractors and the subcontractors' proposed responsibilities. "Subcontract" means any contract, express or implied, between the Contractor and another party or between a subcontractor and another party delegating or assigning, in whole or in part, the making or furnishing of any material or service for the performance of the Contract. All subcontracts shall incorporate by reference the terms and conditions of this Contract. The Contractor is solely responsible for the performance and payment of its subcontractors.

8.5. <u>Independent Contractor</u>. Each party under the Contract shall be for all purposes an independent contractor. Nothing contained herein will be deemed to create an association, a partnership, a joint venture, or a relationship of principal and agent, or employer and employee between the parties. The Contractor shall have complete responsibility and control over its Personnel. Neither the Contractor nor its Personnel shall be, or be deemed to be, or act or purport to act, as an employee, agent, or representative of the County. The Contractor and its Personnel shall have no County employee-type benefits of any kind whatsoever, including without limitation, insurance, pension plan, vacation pay or sick pay, or other right or privilege afforded to County employees. The Contractor and its Personnel shall be responsible for payment of all insurance, taxes, and benefits.

### SECTION 9. OWNERSHIP, CONFIDENTIAL INFORMATION AND BREACH

- 9.1. <u>Ownership</u>. Any and all data, reports, analyses, documents, photographs, pamphlets, plans, specifications, surveys, films, or any other materials created, prepared, produced, constructed, assembled, made performed, or otherwise produced by the Contractor or its Personnel for delivery to the County under this Contract shall be the sole and absolute property of the County. All such property shall constitute "work made for hire" as defined by the U.S. Copyright Act of 1976, 17 U.S.C § 101, and the ownership of the county at the time of its creation. Ownership of the intellectual property includes the right to copyright, patent, and register, and the ability to transfer these rights. Material the Contractor uses to perform this Contract that is not created, prepared, constructed, assembled, made, performed, or otherwise produced for or paid for by the County is owned by the Contractor and is not "work made for hire" within the terms of the Contract.
- 9.2. <u>Confidential Information/Breach</u>. The Contractor shall ensure that all personal identifying information, financial information, and other information submitted or made available to the Contractor by, or on behalf of, the County, or acquired or developed by the Contractor in the performance of the Contract (unless publicly available) is kept confidential, secured, and protected to prevent unauthorized access. Such information will be utilized by the Contractor solely as necessary for the performance of Services under the Contract and not made available to any other person without the County's prior written consent. In the event of unauthorized access or other security breach, the Contractor shall immediately notify the Contract Representative and shall at its sole expense comply with all requirements of RCW 19.255.010, in effect at any given time. Upon expiration or termination of the Contract, all confidential information shall be returned to the County or destroyed at the County's discretion.
- 9.3. <u>Medical Records</u>. If applicable, medical records shall be maintained and preserved by the Contractor in accordance with all applicable laws, including but not limited to RCW 70.41.190, RCW 70.02.160, and standard medical records practice. Contractor shall also be responsible for the proper maintenance and disposal of such medical records.
- 9.4 <u>Unauthorized Disclosure</u>. Contractor agrees that all information, records, and data collected in connection with this Contract shall be protected from unauthorized disclosure in accordance with applicable state and federal law.

9.5 <u>Compliance with the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996</u> (HIPAA). If applicable, Contractor shall not use protected health information created or shared under this Contract in any manner that would constitute a violation of HIPAA or applicable regulations. Contractor shall read and maintain compliance with all HIPAA requirements at the U.S. Office of Civil Rights website: https://www.hhs.gov/hipaa/index.html.

#### SECTION 10. REPRESENTATIONS AND RECORDS

- 10.1. <u>No Fee</u>. The Contractor certifies it has not received, nor paid or agreed to pay, another person or entity, other than a bona fide employee working exclusively for the Contractor, any fee, commission, percentage, gift, or any other consideration contingent upon or resulting from the award or making of the Contract.
- 10.2. <u>Licenses, Permits and Taxes</u>. The Contractor shall, at its own expense, have and maintain all licenses, registrations, permits, and approvals necessary for the performance of the Contract, including without limitation, registration with the Washington State Department of Revenue. The Contractor shall pay all fees (including licensing fees) and applicable federal, state, and local taxes.
- 10.3. <u>Compliance</u>. The Contractor and its Personnel, and the Services provided by the Contractor and its Personnel, shall comply with all applicable laws, codes, and standards in effect at any given time regardless as to whether such laws are referred to by the County. If required for the Services provided, the Contractor and its Personnel shall submit to a background check as directed by the County.
- 10.4. <u>Nondiscrimination</u>. In the performance of this Contractor, Contractor and its Personnel shall not discriminate against any person on the basis of race, color, creed, religion, national origin, age, sex, marital status, sexual orientation, veteran status, disability, or other circumstance prohibited by federal, state, or local law, and shall comply with Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 and Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (Title VI) Public Law 88-352, 42 U.S.C. 2000d-1 et seq., and the Department's implementing regulations, 31 CFR part 22; Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (Section 504), Public Law 93-112, as amended by Public Law 93-516, 29 U.S.C. 794; Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 (Title IX), 20 U.S.C. 1681 et seq., and the Department's implementing regulations, 31 CFR part 28; Age Discrimination Act of 1975, Public Law 94-135, 42 U.S.C. 6101 et seq., and the Department implementing regulations at 31 CFR part 23.
- 10.5. <u>Public Records</u>. The Contractor agrees that the Contract and all records associated with the Contract shall be available to the County for inspection and copying by the public pursuant to the Public Records Act, Chapter 42.56 RCW ("Act"). If the County determines that records in the custody of the Contractor are needed to respond to a request under the Act, the Contractor shall make all such records promptly available to the County at no cost to the County. With the exception of the Contract, if the Contractor considers any portion of any record, electronic or hard copy, to be protected from disclosure under the Act, the Contractor shall clearly identify all specific information it claims to be confidential or proprietary. If the County receives a request under the Act to inspect or copy proprietary information that has been identified by the Contractor as protected from disclosure and the County determines that release of the information is

required by the Act or otherwise appropriate, the County's sole obligation will be to make a reasonable effort to notify the Contractor of the request and the date that such protected information will be released unless the Contractor obtains a court order to enjoin disclosure pursuant to RCW 42.56.540. If the Contractor fails to timely obtain a court order enjoining disclosure, the County will release the requested information on the date specified. The County has no obligation on behalf of the Contractor to claim any exemption from disclosure under the Act. The County will not be liable to the Contractor for releasing records pursuant to the Act.

- 10.6. <u>Advertising, Logo</u>. The Contractor shall not use, advertise, or promote for commercial benefit information concerning the Contract or use any trade name, trademark, or logo of the County, without the County's prior written consent.
- 10.7. <u>Audit and Record Retention.</u> The Contractor and its Personnel shall retain all books, documents, and records relating to performance of the Contract and Services provided in connection with this Contract for six (6) years after completion of the Contract or longer if requested by the County. All records shall be subject to inspection and audit by the County. Upon request, the Contractor shall promptly make available to the County a legible copy of all books, documents, and records at no cost to the County.

### SECTION 11. RIGHTS AND REMEDIES

- 11.1. <u>Failure to Perform</u>. If County determines the Contractor has failed to perform any material obligation of the Contract, and such failure has not been cured within ten (10) days' following notice from the County, the County may without penalty, in its discretion, withhold all monies due the Contractor until such failure is cured to the reasonable satisfaction of the County.
- 11.2. <u>Right of Assurance</u>. If the County in good faith has reason to believe the Contractor does not intend, or is unable to perform, or continue performing under the Contract, the County may demand in writing that the Contractor give a written assurance of intent to perform. Should the Contractor fail to provide adequate assurance to the reasonable satisfaction of the County, by the date specified the demand, the County may terminate all or part of the Contract and pursue all other rights and remedies available at law and in equity.
- 11.3. <u>Responsibility for Errors</u>. All Services shall be completed to the reasonable satisfaction of the County and as required herein. Upon request, the Contractor shall provide any clarifications and/or explanations regarding any Services provided as required by the County, at no additional cost to the County. In the event of an error or omission under the Contract, the Contractor shall, at no cost to the County, provide all necessary design drawings, estimates, and all other professional services the County deems necessary to rectify and correct the matter to the satisfaction of the County. The Contractor shall continue to be responsible for the accuracy of Services, even after the Work is accepted by the County and the termination or expiration of the Contract.
- 11.4. <u>Remedies</u>. All County rights and remedies under the Contract are in addition to, and shall in no way limit, any other rights and remedies that may be available to the County at law and in equity.

- 11.5. <u>Right of Off-Set; Reimbursement</u>. The County will be entitled to offset against any sums due the Contractor and to reimbursement from the Contractor for any damages, expenses, or costs incurred by the County due to the Contractor's nonconforming performance or failure to perform the Services under the Contract.
- 11.6. <u>Waiver</u>. Either party's failure to insist upon the strict performance of any provision of the Contract, or to exercise any right based upon a breach thereof or the acceptance of any performance during such breach, will not constitute a waiver of any right or remedy under the Contract unless expressly so agreed in writing by an authorized representative.
- 11.7. <u>Breach</u>. In the event of a material breach by the Contractor, the County may procure, on terms and in the manner that it deems appropriate, Services to replace those under the Contract. The Contractor shall be liable to the County for any and all costs, expenses, penalties, and fees incurred by the County in procuring such Services in substitution for those due from the Contractor under the Contract.

### SECTION 12. GOVERNING LAW, DISPUTES

- 12.1. <u>Governing Law; Venue</u>. The Contract will be governed in all respects by the laws of the State of Washington, both as to interpretation and performance, without regard to conflicts of law or choice of law provisions. Any action arising out of or in connection with the Contract may be instituted and maintained only in a court of competent jurisdiction in Kitsap County, Washington or as provided by RCW 36.01.050.
- 12.2. <u>Disputes</u>. Conflicts and disagreements between the parties related to the Contract will be promptly brought to the attention of the County. Any dispute relating to the quality or acceptability of performance or compensation due the Contractor will be decided by the County's Contract Representative. All decisions of the County's contract Representative are considered final; however, nothing herein prohibits either party from seeking judicial relief.

# SECTION 13. PREVAILING WAGE

13.1 To the extent applicable, Contractor shall comply with the prevailing wage requirements.

# SECTION 14. GENERAL PROVISIONS

- 14.1. <u>Implied Contract Terms</u>. Each provision of law and any terms required by law to be in the Contract are made a part of the Contract as if fully stated in it.
- 14.2. <u>Headings/Captions</u>. Headings and captions used are for convenience only and are not a part of the Contract and do not in any way limit or amplify the terms and provisions hereof.
- 14.3. <u>No Party the Drafter</u>. The Contract is the product of negotiation between the parties, and no party is deemed the drafter of the Contract.
- 14.4. <u>No Third-Party Beneficiary</u>. No provision of the Contract is intended to, nor will it be construed to, create any third-party beneficiary, or provide any rights or benefits to any person or entity other than the County and the Contractor.

- 14.5. <u>Severability</u>. If a court of competent jurisdiction holds any provision of the Contract to be illegal, invalid, or unenforceable, in whole or in part, the validity of the remaining provisions will not be affected, and the parties' rights and obligations will be construed and enforced as if the Contract did not contain the particular provision held to be invalid. If any provision of the Contract conflicts with any statutory provision of the State of Washington, the provision will be deemed inoperative to the extent of the conflict or modified to conform to statutory requirements.
- 14.6. <u>Precedence</u>. The Contract documents consist of this Contract and its attachments and exhibits. In the event of a conflict between or among the Contract documents, the federal terms shall prevail.
- 14.7. <u>Counterparts/Electronic Signature</u>. The Contract may be executed in several counterparts, each of which will be deemed an original, but all of which together will constitute one and the same agreement. A facsimile, email, or other electronically delivered signatures of the parties shall be deemed to constitute original signatures and deemed to constitute duplicate originals.
- 14.8. <u>Non-Exclusive Contract.</u> The County may at its discretion enter into multiple agreements to obtain the same or similar services that are the subject of this Contract or may have its own employees perform the same or similar services contemplated by the Contract.
- 14.9. <u>Survival</u>. Those provisions of this Contract that by their sense and purpose should survive expiration or termination of the Contract shall so survive. Those provisions include, without limitation: Sections 5 (Indemnification), 6 (Insurance), 8.5 (Independent Contractor), 9 (Ownership, Confidential Information and Breach), 11 (Rights and Remedies), 12 (Governing Law, Disputes), and 14 (General Provisions).
- 14.10. <u>Entire Agreement</u>. The parties acknowledge the Contract is the product of negotiation between the parties and represents the entire agreement of the parties with respect to its subject matter. All previous agreements and representations, whether oral or written, entered into prior to this Contract are hereby revoked and superseded by the Contract.
- 14.11. <u>Authorization</u>. Each party signing below warrants to the other party, that they have the full power and authority to execute this Contract on behalf of the party for whom they sign.
