UNITS

1. COURT OPERATIONS

Provides staff to assist judges in the courtroom, assist the public at the front counter and on telephones. Includes responding to written requests from various individuals, accepting and processing filings, accepting payments, scheduling matters, providing interpreters, applying for and processing grants, collections, and working with various other county departments in day-to-day operations.

2. PROBATION

Monitors compliance with court orders in person and in writing. Regularly working with other agencies and departments to ensure completion of court orders. Report noncompliance to prosecutor's office and court.

3. THERAPEUTIC COURTS – BEHAVIOR HEALTH COURT (BHC) & TEACHING, HEALING, RESILIENCE, INDEPENDENCE, VOICE, EMPOWERMENT (THRIVE)

These courts were formed to address the overrepresentation of those with mental illness in our jail. Using a team-based approach the courts help participants with recovery and accountability. Primarily funded through grants and state appropriated funding the employees work with the participants to get appropriate treatment and education to correct behavior and reduce recidivism in the court system.

GOALS



1. FAIRNESS & IMPARTIALITY

Provide a forum for the impartial resolution of disputes that provides fair and equitable access to the court.

2. USING DATA TO DRIVE RESULTS

Using data and statistics to monitor cases, workflow, and drive procedural changes.

3. CONTINUE THERAPEUTIC COURTS

Rehabilitate and graduate participants through our therapeutic court programs by providing clear, achievable milestones to support them in building stability and accountability.

4. COMPLYNG WITH LEGISLATIVE CHANGES

Collaborate with others, in and out of the judicial system, in response to varied legislative changes.

5. SERVING THE COMMUNITY

Monitoring compliance with court orders through probation including treatment obligations and restitution obligations to the community and law enforcement.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

THERAPEUTIC COURT CHANGES

- Transitioned from 4 5 phases following the All-Rise model.
- Peer support moved to a program specialist allowing for more peer support involvement not only with participants but in the community.
- 18 total therapeutic court graduations (10/2024-8/2025).

TECHNOLOGY UPDATES

- Docket monitors added to courthouse lobby
- Data tracking/reports added to case management system.
- Integration with DOL system and with AOC EDR system.

CIVIL BACKLOG

- Participated in the county summer intern program.
- Intern processed over 11,000 civil documents ending the court's civil backlog that started during COVID.
