Approximately 27 members of the public attended the virtual meeting.

Meeting Overview

The community kick-off workshop introduced the Silverdale Center planning process and engaged participants in sharing their ideas and priorities for the future of the area. The agenda included a presentation, interactive polling, and small group discussions.

A presentation (link) was shared, covering:

- Welcome and Introductions Overview of the planning team and meeting objectives.
- Interactive Polling (I) Participants responded to questions such as:
 - o What is your connection to the Silverdale Center?
 - o What is your favorite place, feature, or thing about the Silverdale Center?
 - How would you describe the Silverdale Center's identity today?

- Project Overview Goals, timeline, engagement activities, and upcoming milestones.

- Understanding Silverdale Today Snapshot of current development patterns, community characteristics, and physical landscape of the Silverdale Center.
- Interactive Polling (II) Participants shared input on:
 - Three things they love about Silverdale Center today
 - Three things they would improve
 - o Hopes for the next 20 years

- Small Group Visioning Discussions Participants were divided into three breakout groups to explore key themes and generate ideas. Each group used visual prompts and a map of the Silverdale Center to guide conversation around four core topics:
 - Commercial Development & Services: What types of businesses or services are desired, and where?
 - o Housing: What types of housing are needed, and in what areas?
 - Third Spaces: What kinds of gathering places are important for community life?
 - Mobility & Connectivity: How do people get around, and where are improvements needed?

Each breakout room presented takeaways to the full group after the small group discussions. Discussion highlights are presented below.

Breakout Group Highlights

Group 1

Facilitator: Scott Diener | Note-taker: Taskina Tareen

- Mixed opinions on big box stores—convenient but lack character
- Desire for more workforce and senior housing
- Strong support for public spaces, community venues, and small parks
- Interest in enhancing pedestrian and bike infrastructure
- Strong desire for ferry connections

Group 2

Facilitator: Jim Rogers | Note-taker: Casey Price

- Concerns about parking availability and design
- o Interest in improved Old Mill Park amenities
- o Silverdale Way seen as a barrier—needs to be more walkable
- Desire to enhance existing assets
- o Support for 3–5 story buildings in the downtown core
- View protection is a key concern—limit building heights
- Desire for mixed-use development and support for local businesses

Group 3

Facilitator: Colin Poff | Note-taker: Ana Costa

- Stormwater management noted as a priority
- o Parking remains a concern
- Strong community value on the waterfront and rowing opportunities
- o Interest in multigenerational housing—for both seniors and youth
- Discussion about reimagining the mall space, referencing Totem Lake as a model
