

# MINUTES OF THE KITSAP COUNTY VETERAN'S ADVISORY BOARD March 8, 2023 In-Person and Online Meeting

**CALL TO ORDER:** The meeting was conducted at Olympic College and called to order by Rick Raymond at 5:30 PM. Access was available to members and the community through Zoom.

**Announcements:** The Chair, Jayme DeGooyer, read the required on-line announcement covering the conduct of voting members and guests during the meeting.

Introductions: Rick Raymond led introductions of board members and other attendees.

**Approval of Agenda:** A motion was made and seconded to approve the agenda. The motion was unanimously approved.

**Approval of minutes:** The February minutes were reviewed by members. A motion was made and seconded to accept the minutes as written. The motion was unanimously approved.

**Speakers:** Ms. Maria Dozeman, representing Puget Sound Energy delivered a presentation covering a variety of programs that are available to qualified community members who may be struggling to pay utility bills. Eligibility for many of the programs are income based. Kitsap Community Resources is the primary point of contact for utility bill help in Kitsap County, but Maria mentioned that there is an initiative underway that may bring administration of these assistance programs under PSE in the future, perhaps some time in 2024. A copy of the presentation is attached. Maria will be conducting more outreach events in the weeks to come.

Mr. David Puente, Director of the Washington Department of Veterans Affairs (WDVA), discussed the many programs available to veterans in the state. He emphasized the value of certified Veteran Service Officers in the state who undergo specialized training that helps assure disability claims filed with the VA are thoroughly prepared and quickly adjudicated by the Veterans Administration. He noted the average veteran in Kitsap County is receiving about \$200 dollars per month less than the average veteran in the state. He attributes this difference in part to the quality of the applications that are filed by certified VSOs throughout the state in those counties that have them.

#### **Reports:**

- a. Veterans Assistance Fund (VAF). Rick Becker commented that monthly expenditures are running behind the same period last year. This is in part due to Garry Hughes catching up on requests that were submitted during his absence. Rick will monitor future expenditures and veteran demand.
- b. Committee Reports.
  - Aging Veterans Services. Jayme DeGooyer noted the position is vacant and asked members to contact her to volunteer to keep the VAB informed about community services that can assist our veterans over the age of 60.
  - **Housing and Homelessness.** Branden Davis announced he is in the midst of applying for funding grants for his transitional housing project.
  - **Public Affairs and Social Media.** Input from members for the Facebook page is always welcome. It is a good place to post announcements for veteran plans and programs.
  - **Special Event Support.** Peggy Roy commented that Stand Down and Run to Tahoma planning is progressing well. Volunteers are needed to staff the registration desk at the

Stand Down as has been done by the VAB at previous events. VAB members are asked to be available for the Stand Down between 10am and 2pm on 22 April. Rick Becker thanks members for supporting the Military Appreciation Day event. The VAB table saw many visitors and members had a good opportunity to meet other community service providers. Event organizers estimate about 3,000 people attended the event.

- **Veteran Education.** No report this month.
- **Veteran Health Care.** The Silverdale VA clinic is hiring new staff which may allow for more enrollment. Call (360) 307-6920 to inquire about future enrollment opportunities.
- Veteran Mental Health Plans and Programs. Rick Raymond reported that planning is underway for an event on 10 September and that he is collaborating with others in the county on a variety of suicide prevention initiatives.
- **Veterans Garden.** George Holden reported that the Veterans Garden has been assigned plot 38 at the Blueberry Park P-Patch in Bremerton. The park is located on Sylvan Way and is close to bus transportation. Work parties are planned to prepare the garden for planning on 11 and 28 March. Reach out to George if you have questions. A flier is attached.
- Women's Resource Group. Jayme is working on inventory and is prepared to participate in the April Stand Down at Sheridan Community Center in Bremerton on 22 April.

a. Jayme DeGooyer announced that two VAB board candidates were interviewed recently and were recommended to the Board of Commissioners for appointment. All VAB members are invited to attend. The VAB now has one unfilled position. Rebecca Pirtle is recruiting. VAB members can refer interested community members to Rebecca for details.



Helps connect veterans and military families to resources that help decrease tobacco dependence, increase cessation efforts, and support for staying stopped.


# **DIGITAL NAVIGATOR PROGRAM**

# Step 3: Documents

- Picture ID with birthdate for the applicant
- Verification of total household income for the three months prior to the month of appointment for everyone in your house
- Adults age 18 and older with no income in any one of the three required months must sign additional forms to confirm no income
- Current month's energy bill
- Disconnection notice with current address (if applicable)
- Rent/lease agreement or proof of residence

Depending on circumstances, more information may be required.

- Provides short-term, emergency bill payment assistance to PSE customers facing financial difficulties.

# What is Home Weatherization Assistance?



- Free upgrades for single-family homes, manufactured homes or eligible apartment buildings.
- The Home Weatherization Assistance program is a partnership between PSE, federal and state funding sources.
- Upgrades can include insulation, duct sealing, etc.—so that the heated air stays inside the home.

# What is the Process Like?



- The Home Weatherization Assistance program is not administered through PSE.
- Due to staffing and supply shortages, wait times can be long.
- Professional contractors employed by the agency conduct a home assessment to determine how best to weatherize the home and possibly upgrade equipment that is old or inefficient. The list of free upgrades could be extensive.



# What is Efficiency Boost?



PSE created the Efficiency Boost program to offer higher rebates on energy-efficient upgrades to incomequalified customers. Improve the comfort and efficiency of your home without breaking the bank.



### Efficiency Boost Incentives



- Receive <u>additional</u> rebates on insulation, windows, water heaters, furnaces, heat pumps, boilers, thermostats, and clothes washers
- Efficiency Boost incentives for 2023
  - Added \$150 rebate for smart and \$100 for line voltage connected thermostats.
  - Added \$100 rebate for front-loading clothes washers.
  - Increased natural gas furnace and boiler rebates from \$600 to \$1,000.
  - Increased ductless heat pump rebates from \$1,600 to \$2,400.


# What is Income Eligible Community Solar?



- Community Solar is a new renewable energy program that offers 100% local solar energy without having to invest in or install your own solar system.
- You subscribe to shares in a newly constructed, local solar energy site of your choice and receive bill credits for the energy that your shares generate.
- Income-eligible customers will be able to participate at no cost.



#### HOW PSE COMMUNITY SOLAR WORKS



#### GENERATE

Local communities and organizations within PSE's service area host solar panels to generate clean solar energy.

#### DELIVERY

The solar energy is delivered to PSE's grid and collectively drives growth in a clean energy supply for all.

#### CUSTOMER

Subscribers share the benefits of 100% local solar without the need to install or maintain solar panels on their own.
