


Environmental Justice & Supplemental Indexes

The EJ indexes help users screen for potential EJ concerns. To do this, the EJ index combines data on low income and people of colo populations with a single environmental indicator.


EJ INDEXES FOR THE SELECTED LOCATION

In compliance with the Presidential Executive Order 12898, United States Department of Transportation (USDOT) Order 5610.2 and Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) Order 6640.23, an Environmental Justice (EJ) Analysis was conducted for the National STEM School Project. The results of the EJ Decision Matrix (see attached) indicate that there are protected populations present and the project requires the acquisition of more than 10 percent of a parcel. The parcels to be purchased by Kitsap County are 417 and 423 South National Avenue in Bremerton, Washington. The analysis presented herein complies with approved Washington State Department of Transportation (WSDOT) guidance and procedures and meets the provisions of Executive Order 12898.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The project will support the Regional and Military Centers by reducing conflicts and safety concerns between pedestrians and vehicles, preserve the roadway pavement and improve the National Avenue and Loxie Eagans intersection level of service. The project will include the following:

- Add a sidewalk and bike lane on the west side of National Avenue from vicinity of Arsenal Way to vicinity of Preble Street.
- Extend the southbound right turn lane on National Avenue at Loxie Eagans Boulevard and optimize signal timing at the intersection.
- Close L Street vehicle access to National Avenue to reduce pedestrian and vehicle conflicts near the interchange. A hammerhead turnaround will be provided for emergency vehicle access.
- Pavement overlay and Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (ADA) renovation (as needed) on National Avenue from the vicinity of Charleston Beach Road to vicinity of 1st Street (City Limits).
- Pavement overlay and ADA renovation (as needed) on Loxie Eagans Boulevard from vicinity of City limits to vicinity of Arsenal Way.
- Stormwater improvements will be constructed and include catch basins and conveyance pipe. In addition, a bioretention cell will be installed on the west side of the intersection of National Avenue and L Street.

PROJECT EFFECTS

The most significant effect of the project is to improve pedestrian, and bicycle safety and access along National Avenue and Loxie Eagans Boulevard, extending for approximately 1 mile. These improvements will benefit all

users regardless of race, age, income level or language spoken. The project will also generally improve community cohesion and connection.

The project may result in temporary delays to traffic users during construction. These restrictions will be temporary in nature and only during portions of the construction. There will be no road closures or detours that will be required as part of this project. Kitsap Transit has bus routes that run the length of National Avenue within the project area. The bus route is anticipated to provide uninterrupted service during all construction activities. However, a bus pad will be installed as part of the project at the bus stop across from West Hills S.T.E.M. Academy between J Street and I Street and might result in some temporary changes. Kitsap County will coordinate and accommodate what may be needed to temporarily relocate the bus stop to a location of Kitsap Transit's choice. Therefore, this element of the project will not have an effect on protected populations.

The project will not require any relocations or displacements of protected populations. Some right-of-way acquisition and/or take is required for the project and property will be purchased, but this will not displace any protected populations and will be limited. The properties to be purchased by Kitsap County and residents relocated are 417 and 423 South National Avenue.

DETERMINATION

No minority or low-income populations have been identified that would be adversely affected by this project as identified above. Therefore, this project has met the provisions of Executive Order 12898, as it is supported by Title VI of the Civil Rights Act.










EJ INDEXES FOR THE SELECTED LOCATION




EJ INDEXES FOR THE SELECTED LOCATION





Determination

In compliance with the Presidential Executive Order 12898, United States Department of Transportation (USDOT) Order 5610.2 and Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) Order 6640.23, an Environmental Justice (EJ) Analysis was conducted for the Fairgrounds Road Sidewalk Improvement Project. The results of the EJ Decision Matrix (see attached) indicate that there are protected populations present. The analysis presented herein complies with approved Washington State Department of Transportation (WSDOT) guidance and procedures and meets the provisions of Executive Order 12898.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Providing the public with opportunities to make choices among alternative modes of travel, and emphasizing moving people rather than vehicles, are some of the primary goals in the Kitsap County Comprehensive Plan. Kitsap County received a Puget Sound Regional Council (PSRC) grant for NW Fairgrounds Road that will help fund the construction of curb, gutter, and 6-foot sidewalks on both sides of the road, an eastbound 5-foot bike lane, and illumination between Woodridge Lane NW and Nels Nelson Road NW. This section of NW Fairgrounds Road provides indirect connections to several schools; Fairview Middle School, Woodlands Elementary School, and Olympic High School. The grant project will benefit the students of all three schools, making it easier and safer for students to walk and ride bicycles to and from these schools.

The proposed improvements consist of curb, gutter, and 6-foot sidewalks on both sides of the road, an eastbound 5-foot bike lane, and illumination between Woodridge Lane NW and Nels Nelson Road NW. The existing roadside ditches on the north and south side of NW Fairgrounds Road will be filled in to construct the sidewalks. New curb and gutter, catch basins, and conveyance piping will be installed to collect and convey stormwater to existing outfalls in nearby drainage basins. One bioretention facility will be installed on the west end of the project prior to the existing outfall to meet the requirements in the Kitsap County's Stormwater Manual.

The closest elementary school is Woodlands Elementary School. The school demographic data is summarized in Table 2 below. The demographic data is different than the 2010 census data. This is likely because of the larger school boundaries (approximately 2 square miles) compared to a ½ mile radius around this linear corridor project.

PROJECT EFFECTS

The most significant effect of the project is to improve pedestrian, and bicycle safety and access along Fairgrounds Road, extending for approximately 0.5 miles. These improvements will benefit all users regardless of race, age, income level or language spoken. The project will also generally improve community cohesion and connection.

The following elements of the project will not have an effect on protected populations:

- The project will require right of way acquisitions at the intersection corners in order to accommodate the installation of the new curb, gutter, sidewalk, and curb ramps. However, the acquisition will not require relocation of real and/or personal property and do not require more than 10 percent of any parcel.
- Kitsap Transit does not have a bus route that runs the length of Fairgrounds Road within the project area.
- The project will have no operational increase in noise.

Pedestrian and vehicle access will be maintained during construction. No detour will be required. Short-term increases in noise and dust will impact adjacent residences during construction, but these impacts will be mitigated through best management practices.

DETERMINATION

No minority or low-income populations have been identified that would be adversely affected by this project as identified above. Therefore, this project has met the provisions of Executive Order 12898, as it is supported by Title VI of the Civil Rights Act.



ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE SCREENING – REVISED

INTRODUCTION

This memorandum documents findings for the Environmental Justice (EJ) analysis of the Newberry Hill Road fish passage culvert replacement project. This memorandum documents analysis undertaken to determine if minority or low-income populations will be impacted by the project. This analysis complies with approved WSDOT guidance and procedures. The completed EJ Decision Matrix for Small Projects is provided in Attachment A.

PROJECT LOCATION











Figure 1. Vicinity Map




Figure 2. Site Aerial PhotoNewberry Hill Road Culvert Replacement

The project is located in the NE ¼ of Section 26 and the SE ¼ of Section 25, Township 25 North, Range 1 West, W.M. The project site is largely within the existing NW Newberry Hill Road right-of-way and includes small portions of parcels adjacent to the Kitsap County right-of-way (see attached Figures 1 and 2).

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The purpose of the project is to eliminate an existing fish passage barrier on Anderson Creek by replacing an existing 160-ft long, 36-inch diameter fish passage barrier culvert under NW Newberry Hill Road with a new concrete box culvert that is fish passable. The project will excavate the existing roadway and embankment and remove the existing 36-inch diameter culvert and replace it with a new 13-ft to 15-ft wide, 150-ft long concrete box culvert. Roadway embankment will be replaced to bring the roadway surface back to the existing grade. Existing roadway surfaces and features that are disturbed by construction will be replaced in-kind at their current limits and locations, and there will be no expansion of roadway areas or capacity.

Detour Description

The project will require a detour during construction for approximately 30 to 60 days. Newberry Hill Road provides direct freeway access to State Highway 3 for residents of Seabeck, Wildcat Lake, Lake Symington, Lake Tahuyeh, Holly and areas to the west.

Newberry Hill Road is anticipated to be closed to through traffic within the project limits for the culvert removal, culvert installation and embankment fill portions of the project. Due to the rural nature of the area, there are no immediate parallel roadways to accommodate traffic around the road closure. Kitsap County has evaluated detour alternatives and has selected a southern detour route (see Attachment B) that minimizes impacts on travel time, emergency services and number of intersections effected (Kitsap County 2018).

DEMOGRAPHICS DATA

Table 1 summarizes EPA EJ Screen (EPA 2023) data for the immediate site area (within approximately 0.5 square miles) as well as within the general detour zone (typically 2 to 3 mile radius of the project). Demographic data from the EPA EJScreen for both the project site and the detour zone are provided in Attachment C.

There are three Central Kitsap School District schools located within the general detour zone; Silverdale Elementary School, Klahowya Secondary School and the Central Kitsap High School. School demographic data from the State Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) for these three schools is summarized in Table 2.

The average student body percentage of people of color (POC) students is 36 percent based on OSPI data, compared to EJScreen data reporting 16 and 23 percent of minority population near the project site and within the detour zone, respectively. Low income percentages are 9% and 5% as reported by EJScreen and OSPI, respectively. Demographically, these two sources are within 15% for POC variable (for detour zone), and 5 percentage points for Low Income, thereby demonstrating the data sources are reasonably accurate.

Closest Elementary School Data

The closest elementary school to the project site is Silverdale Elementary, which is located at 9100 Dickey Road NW, approximately 2 miles northeast of the site. Demographic data for Silverdale Elementary is shown in Table 3.

POTENTIAL PROJECT EFFECTS

Potential project effects were evaluated for both the project site and detour route.

Potential Project Effects – Project Site

The existing land use in the 0.5 mile radius area surrounding the project is primarily low density rural residential and County park/open space. A small commercial zone is located approximately 0.5 miles west of the site at the intersection of Newberry Hill Road and Seabeck Highway, and the Klahowya Secondary School is located approximately 0.5 miles to the east of the project site.

The project site is located in unincorporated Kitsap County outside any Urban Growth Area (UGA). The project consists of construction of a new culvert, with in-kind replacement of paved surfaces. The proposed improvements will be consistent with the existing and projected land uses, which are primarily park/open space and low density rural residential.

The project will acquire small portions of two parcels for a total area of approximately 3,833 sq-ft (0.09 acres). These acquisitions are undeveloped vegetated areas located directly adjacent to the culvert site (see attached Figure 3). No business or residential relocations will occur because of these acquisitions.

The project is not located in an Air Quality Non-Attainment Area or Maintenance Area and would have no potential air quality impacts. There would be no increase in noise levels due to the completed project. During construction, short-term increases in dust and noise could impact adjacent residences, however, these impacts are not highly adverse or long in duration and will be mitigated through use of best management practices.

Potential Project Effects – Detour Route

During construction, it will be necessary to close Newberry Hill Road for an estimated 30 to 60 days. A detour will therefore be necessary. Kitsap County evaluated detour route options and potential impacts including time of travel, level of service (LOS) and emergency service response times (Kitsap County 2018).

Overall, the majority of traffic traversing Newberry Hill Road within the project limits can be described as through traffic with origins or destinations beyond the immediate area. However, citizens residing off Sesame Street near the project site will be most impacted by increases in travel distances and travel times between their homes and the Silverdale and Bremerton areas as a result of the road closure. Impacts to residents of this area will consist of an increase of approximately 10 minutes in travel time to reach SR3 and the Silverdale commercial area.

The detour will result in peak hour LOS impacts at the Chico Way and Erlands Point intersection which will require a temporary traffic signal to avoid LOS F operations for the southbound Chico Way to eastbound Erlands Point left turn. All other intersections will operate at LOS E or better during the traffic detour timeframe (Kitsap County 2018).

Kitsap Transit routed buses currently do not serve Newberry Hill Road so no transit impacts at the project site are expected. Transit impacts due to the detour may include minor delays at

signalized and stop controlled intersections near Silverdale and Chico; however, with proposed mitigation as described above these delays are not expected to exceed LOS standards.

Closure of Newberry Hill Road in the vicinity of the culvert is not expected to have a significant impact to emergency response times. There are two fire stations that serve the project area; one is located at 6470 Seabeck Highway (1.44 miles southwest of the site) and the other is located at 5300 Newberry Hill Road (1.83 miles east of the site). Fire response times from the fire stations to the project site are estimated at 1.71 minutes from the Seabeck Highway fire station and 2.0 minutes from the Newberry Hill fire station (Kitsap County 2018).

Overall, construction of the project will temporarily increase travel time for some residents by up to approximately 10 minutes for an estimated 30 to 60 day period. No impacts to transit or emergency services are expected.

DETERMINATION

Although EJ populations do exist in the project area, no minority or low-income populations have been identified that would be significantly adversely affected by this project as determined above. Therefore, this project has met the provisions of Executive Order 12898, as it is supported by Title VI of the Civil Rights Act.

Newberry Hill Road Culvert Replacement Kitsap County Public Works








Figure 4. Right of Way Areas Newberry Hill Road Culvert Kitsap County Public Works
