Fee schedule for Title 26 Guardian ad Litem cases

Deposits:

Required deposit of \$5,000.00; this deposit is due before the start of an investigation.

Please be aware that some investigations incur much more time and, therefore, more funds than the initial deposit. Depending on the case, the Guardian ad Litem Order may pre-approve additional funds prior to needing to seek court approval. Other investigations are completed below the deposit amount. For those cases which extend beyond the amount of the additional deposit I will seek court direction regarding payment, although the fees are usually assigned by the court to the parents.

Additional deposit of \$1,000.00 is required and all other GAL fees resolved prior to trial should the case proceed to trial.

Fees and charges:

Fees: \$150.00 per hour. Fees will be charged against the initial deposit. Any fees incurred in addition to the deposit will be due at the close of the case unless other arrangements are made. If the investigation does not use the entire deposit, the unused amount will be refunded when GAL is dismissed. Unless the court orders otherwise, the funds will be returned to the party paying the deposit (or in proportional share if more than one person paid the deposit).

Charges which may be incurred that are in additional to normal hourly fees: There may be expenses incurred in investigation, for example, as the direct costs of gaining records or criminal history. These fees will be charged against the initial deposit.

In addition, copies of GAL records/file (if GAL agrees to copy) are \$0.20/page for a paper copy. Electronic copies require scanning, etc. and will be charged at the hourly rate. Fees for copies of GAL file are due when the file is delivered and are in addition to the deposit.
