Initial Public Comment (2-minute limit per person)

• Joe Lubischer: corrections for the Dec. 2023 issue of the Rotary's column re: stormwater (stating that the Arborwood development does not follow modern codes); climate (inserting corrections from the 2020 Kitsap County Climate Change Resiliency Assessment); and aquifers (stating that "aquifer recharge is greater without trees" is misleading).

Questions from KCAC members:

- Beth: life expectancy of new buildings?
 - o 50-70 years, eligible for state matching funds at the 30 year mark
- Glen: child growth projections for our area?
 - O Slight growth in the next decade of approx. 300-500 kids across the district
- Logan: plan for ongoing maintenance of existing structures and grounds?
 - O Moving forward, there will always be a bond with a capital levy under the bond. As major deferred maintenance items get ticked off, they can engage in preventative maintenance. Only fully funded for 13 total custodians and maintenance staff. District runs at 30, local levy supports the rest.
- Dave: interest rates are high and likely to decrease. Plan for that?
 - O Total ask will remain the same but the way it will be financed may change. Extra capacity built into the bond plan. If the rates go down, they can re-fund the bond.
- Jett: location of proposed Pearson elementary move?
 - Near Viking
- Noah: how has the district engaged with the community in years leading up to this bond measure?
 - NKSD Advisory committees open to anyone to join, info on website. Facilities and finance advisory committees. 25-40 people serving depending on the year. School Board open public meetings twice per month. Bond info brought to this group multiple times
- Beth: how many students in the district go to private schools?
 - We have 5100 students enrolled in public schools. Top reasons for students leaving have to do with moving to another public school district. Total number of private enrollees not known.

Questions from the audience:

• How long will the amount taxpayers pay associated with this bond remain \$50/year for every \$.5M assessed home value?

- o Bond lasts 20-22 years
- What can be done to make play fields upgraded and more available to children?
 - O In the long term plan. Another bond or a future capital levy would be fields. Everyone has to get into a cycle of taking a turn.
 - O Baseball coach in audience: once field is turfed and there are lights, then the high school field could be used for little league players
- Will the new Wolfle building be closer to Bond Road?
 - O Yes. Construction flip flops on each piece of property every 50-70 years. Put up a big fence to separate kids from construction and the traffic gets rerouted. 2.5 yr process
- Have you done a photovoltaic analysis?
 - No. Typically done once you have funding.
- Do you have a green power policy intent?
 - Something the board would want to discuss. Would be difficult and expensive.
