

Expand community engagement.

- The Homes for All Leadership Group meets monthly to provide innovative, cross-sector leadership on homelessness.
- Quarterly performance dashboard reports are provided to the public and decision makers.
- 10+ presentations on homelessness delivered to community groups.
- Kitsap Homeless Veteran Symposium was held in May 2017.

Continuously improve the homeless crisis response system.

- 2018 Homeless Housing Plan was approved by Board of Commissioners, May 2018.
- Coordinated Entry program increased outreach to unsheltered homeless individuals.
- Severe Weather Shelter Program expanded to include Poulsbo and Silverdale sites.
- Permanent Ordinance on Transitory Accommodations approved by Board of Commissioners.
- Expanded volunteer outreach for the Annual Point in Time Count Survey.

Kitsap Homeless Housing Grant Program

Homeless Housing Grant Program funds are authorized by the Washington State legislature and are collected through a fee on certain transactions recorded at the Auditor's Office.

These grant funds are distributed through a competitive process to Kitsap housing programs and social service providers working to implement the strategies and action steps identified in the Kitsap Homeless Crisis Response and Housing Plan.

The Kitsap Homeless Crisis Response and Housing Plan outlines five goals for addressing homelessness (listed in the blue bars above). Each goal includes specific strategies and action steps. Programs awarded Homeless Housing Grant Program funds are required to submit quarterly progress reports, comply with monitoring requirements, and meet performance measures.

Collectively, all the Kitsap housing and homeless service providers make up the Kitsap Homeless Crisis Response System. Performance measures reflected in this report are reported to Washington State for the System, and are consistent with federal performance measures.

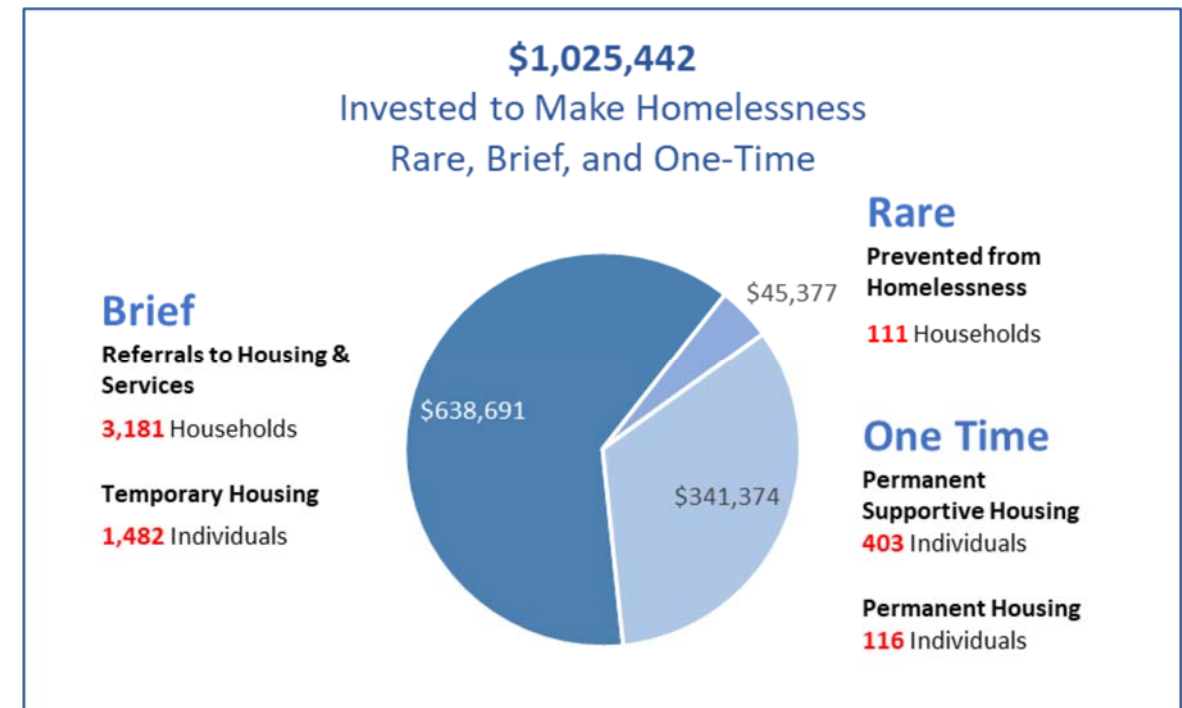
